

A prenuptial agreement is a written contract created by two people before they are

The prenuptial agreement typically lists all of the property and assets owned by each person. It also identifies what each person's legal property rights will be after the marriage ends. Stated more simply, what would a person be entitled to if the marriage is dis-

Disclosure of property and assets owned by each person is a requirement for enforcement of a prenuptial agreement. Disclosure is required in Pennsylvania. The disclosure of each person's property and assets need not be exact, but it does need to be considered

A prenuptial agreement is considered a useful document because it helps people

Did You Know?

Why There Are 24 Hours In A Day

The standard started with the ancient Sumerians, who also invented the first known system of writing. Their mathematical system was based on the number 12, just as ours is based on the number 10. The Sumerians, it is surmised, counted not the 10 digits of the hands, but the 12 segments of the 4 fingers on each hand. Twelve was considered a magical number because it is the lowest number with the greatest number of divisors-it is easily split into half or thirds or quarters or sixths, whereas 10 can only be cut in half or into fifths.



Their systems weights, measures, money were all based on 12, and so was their system of time. It was the Sumerians who first divided the day into 12 parts, with each segment equal to 2 of our hours. Later, the Egyptians modified the system by dividing the day into 24 seg-

And in case you wee wondering, the Babylonians are responsible for our current system of having 60 minutes in an hour and 60 seconds in a minute.

Delicious Polonaise Recipes

(Dried) Lima Beans & Pork Rinds Fasola "Jash" (Sucha) Ze

Soak 2 c. dried Lima beans in 8 c water overnight, then cook in same water 1 1/2 hrs or until tender: Drain. Before you even start cooking the beans, cut up the rind from a 1 1/2 lb. slab of bacon or salt pork into several slices and cook separately in water until tender. This may take 2-3 hours. Cut the soft rind into small strips and return to water over drained, cooked beans, bring to boil, cover and allow it to set 15-20 mins. Mix in a little flour for a thicker sauce, season to taste with salt, pepper and savory and simmer briefly.

Wax Beans Polonaise Fasolka: Szparagowa z Tarta Bulka

Wash 1 1/2 Ibs wax beans, cut off ends and remove strings. Cook in just enough salted boiling water to cover 10-15 mins. Fork test them for doneness. Beans may be cooked whole or-if they are on the long side-cut in half or even in three. Drain, remove to platter and drench with Polonaise topping.

Creamed Cabbage Biala Kapusta w Smietanie

Shred or chop one 2-lb. head of cabbage. Place in pot and scald with salted boiling water to cover. Add 1-2 t. sugar and 2 T fat (bacon or salt-pork drippings, lard or butter), cover and bring to a boil. Uncover, reduce heat and cook until cabbage is tender. Remove from heat. Fork blend 1/4 to 1/2 c. sour cream- with 2 T flour and stir in. Simmer briefly. Season with salt, pepper and lemon juice to taste.

Optional: Sprinkle with chopped dill or crushed caraway seeds. A grated cooking apple may also be added at the start of cooking.

Wax Beans Stewed with Tomatoes Fasolka Szparagowa Duszona

z Pomidorami

Wash, cut off ends and remove strings from 1 1/2 Ibs. wax beans and cut into 2 or 3 pieces. Slice 2 small onions wafer thin and simmer in 3 T butter or oil until transparent. In pot, mix beans with onions and drippings, add 2 T boiling water, sprinkle with pepper and (optional) a pinch of savory, and simmer covered on low heat about 10 mins. Add a little more boiling water if beans begin to sizzle. Scald 3-4 small tomatoes and remove skins, dice and add to beans together with 2 buds mashed garlic. Toss gently, cover and continde to simmer until fully cooked. Salt to taste and serve garnished with chopped dill.

Asparagus Polonaise Szparagi z Tarta Bulka

Gently scrub 2 Ibs. asparagus and scrape away skin, starting at the bottom. Cut away tough bottoms if any. (Fresh supermarket asparagus may already be trimmed and ready to cook. Cover with salted boiling water and cook 10-15 mins. or until tender. Another way is to tie the asparagus into bundles with strong white thread, stand upright in pot and cook in boiling salted water 20 mins. or until tender. Either way, a teaspoon or so of sugar may be added to boiling water and 1/2 c. milk may be added to pot. Drain and remove to serving platter. Remove threads if you have used the bundle method. Drench with browned, buttered bread crumbs. A sprinkle of chopped dill may be added.

Brussel Sprouts Polonaise Brakselka/Kapusta Brakselka Po

Polsku

Remove yellowed, wilted leaves from 2 lbs. Brussel sprouts, wash well, place in pot, cover with salted boiling water with 1 t. sugar added and cook uncovered 10-15 mins. or until tender. Drain. Top with browned, buttered bread crumbs.

Variation: After draining, sprinkle with a little lemon juice and drench with melted butter. These tasty little cabbages are also good with bechamel sauce.

The summer ice tea and coffees along with the fruits and cookies are all ready for our guests.. however; I notice that our guests are in a rare and somewhat angry, and sad mood....considering the beautiful weather beaming down from the beautiful patio. the conversation seems to be heated about all the child abuse going on today, plus the drugs our kids are taking and doing horrible things, plus all the other teen violence. What is going on in the world we live in today? Therefore, today I would like to share with you a story written by Randy and Malanie Bordelon; however; this story is revised by me to fit today's real problems.....The story is called, *A DIFFERENT DRUG PROB*-

The other day, someone at a store in our town red that a Methamphetamine lab had found in an old farmhouse in the adjoining county, and he asked me a rhetorical question. "Why didn't we have a drug problem when you and I were growing up?

I replied, I had a drug problem when I was young: I was drug to church on Sunday morning. I was drug to church for weddings and funerals. Tips To Quit Smoking

When smokers craving a cigarette walked for 15 to 20 minutes on a treadmill, they were less likely to have the urge to smoke 20 minutes later compared with smokers who sat quietly for 40 minutes.

Theory: Exercise, like nicotine, triggers the release of "feel-good" chemicals such as dopamine in the brain, so substituting ne for the other can help ease cravings. If you are trying to quit smoking; walk as often as you can, particularly before time when you expect to experience cravings such as during a stressful

Ouitting smoking cuts the risk of lung cancer as well as other forms of cancer, heart disease and stroke. It may be difficult, but you will be glad you did!

Set a Date: Tell family, friends and co-workers, anticipate challenges, remove cigarettes, ash trays, etc., Talk to your doctor about getting help. Try to not smoke for just 1 day! Do it for your family. Do it for yourself!

Did You Know if you quit smoking, your body will begin a series of changes? Within 20 minutes your heart rate drops; 12 Hours, Carbon monoxide levels in your blood drop to normal; 2 weeks to 3 months, your heart attack risk begins to drop and lung function begins to improve; In 1 - 9 months your coughing and shortness of breath decrease; In 1 year your added risk of coronary heart disease is half that of a smoker.
