
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Debutantes Introduced at the 32nd Annual Ball

At The National Katyn Memorial

On a recent visit to Baltimore, Jack, Greg and Karen Bednarski visited The National Katyn Memorial which honors the Katyn Forest Massacre. The memorial commemorates the execution of 20,000 Polish officers, soldiers, intellectuals, professionals and priests by the Soviets in 1940. They were among Poland's finest who died because they refused to accept Stalin's philosophy. They will be remembered through the ages and included among history's martyrs, hopefully never to happen again. "Nigdy Wiecej".

Situated on a nicely landscaped roundabout the memorial has, at its center, a beautiful golden sculpture with a fountain created by the artist Andrew Pitynski. Here, one can read a description of the monument and a history of the massacre. The sculpture includes representations of the Polish Eagle, three Polish Kings, Polish officers, Kosciuszko, Pulaski, Czarny and names and photos of victims.

For - Bog, Honor, Ojczyzna. (God, Honor, Country.)

The memorial is located at the junction of Felicia and Alicianna Sts., it is well worth the visit !

200th Anniversary of Chopin Birth Prompts Concert

Polish Union USA and Wilkes University Polish Room Committee in co-operation with WVIA-FM, Pittston, recently commemorated the 200th Anniversary of the birth of Fryderyk Chopin with a Simply Grand Concert.

Polish Union USA sponsored pianist, Ko-Eun Lee, 2009 Kosciuszko Foundation Chopin Competition winner, who presented a live piano recital and performed the works of Fryderyk Chopin, Karol Szymanowski, and Johann Sebastian Bach.

The featured works of Chopin included Scherzo No. 1 in B minor, Op. 20, Nocture in G minor, Op. 37, No. 1 and No. 2, impromptu No. 1 in A flat major, Op. 29, Impromptu No. 3 in G flat major, Op. 51, Scherzo No. 2 in B flat minor, Op. 31.

This commemorative Concert was held on August 22, 2010 in the Sordoni Theater at WVIA-FM in Pittston.

Ko-Eun Lee is a graduate of the Julliard School of Music, New York City where she studied with Jerome Lowenthal. In April 2009 she was awarded first prize in the Kosciuszko Foundation Nation Chopin Competition and performed at the gala celebration of the 60th Anniversary of the Kosciuszko Foundation Chopin Competition at the Carnegie Weill Recital Hall. Ms. Lee recently won the World Piano Competition in Cincinnati, Ohio. She will be performing at the Alice Tully Hall (Lincoln Center) in a solo concert in the near future.





For people of Polish and Slavic heritage, Easter would not be the same without the presence of delightful decorated eggs which fascinate and enchain children of all ages. They are called Pisanki (pee-sahn-kee)



The Polish Chef

Paczki (Polish Doughnuts)

At this time of the year (before Lent), it has been a tradition in Polish homes, as far back as people can remember, to make paczki (or Polish doughnuts). Here is a step-by-step recipe for making your own paczki (pronounced punch-key).

Step 1—Make the sponge:

1 c. lukewarm milk; 1 c sifted flour; 2 pkgs. dry yeast; 1 T. sugar; 2 T. warm water. Dissolve the yeast in warm water and add sugar. Add the yeast mixture to the milk and flour. Cover, let rise until double in bulk

Step 2—Make the dough:

Take 5 eggs and add one C. confectioner's sugar. Beat well until lemon-colored. Combine with the sponge and mix well. Add 1 t. vanilla, 1 t rum flavor, 1 T. orange rind and 1 T. lemon rind. Then add- 1 1/2 T salt and 1/4 lb. soft butter and mix well.

Add 6 c. sifted flour gradually to the above mixture and knead dough until it comes away from the hand. Cover, set aside in warm place and let rise until double.

Flour a board lightly. Divide the dough into three parts. Pat dough until 1/2 inch thick. Cut doughnuts with cutter or inverted glass. Let rise until double

Step 3—Fry the paczki:

Heat oil to 350 degrees, drop doughnuts into the hot oil and fry on one side until golden and puffy, then, turn on the other and continue to fry until other side is golden. Remove and place on paper towels to drain. Roll lightly in granulated sugar or glaze with icing.

Recipe makes two dozen good-sized paczki.

Notes: The paczki can be frozen up to three months. To serve, place them in a brown paper bag, sprinkle the bag with water and place in a warm oven until the doughnuts are hot—about 20 mins.

The paczki can be filled with jelly, a pastry tube is used after the doughnuts are fried.

Cold Weather Warmer-Upper

Need something to put in your thermos on a hunting or ice-fishing trip or an outdoor job? Want to treat guests to something different or just relax by the fire on a cold winter's night? Try this:

Mleko z Miodem Hot Milk & Honey:

Combine in pot 1 c. milk (preferably whole milk but no leaner than 2%) and 1 heaping T. honey and gently heat to a boil. An excellent remedy for sleeplessness. For cold symptoms add 1 t. butter to pot.

What Will You Do ?

Recently I attended a seminar where Elie Wiesel, spoke of his experiences in the Nazi Concentration Camps of WW II. As a child of fifteen, he was taken away along with his whole family and community. Somehow he survived the Holocaust to tell the world his story. The world was indifferent to the plight of the Jews at that time. Wiesel's message to us was simple –

“Indifference supports the oppressor. Indifference is the opposite of love.”

He encouraged us to become aware of the evil indifference brings. Indifference is all around us. I believe that fear and confusion make us indifferent and, after all, we have our own problems.

Irena (Krzyzanowska) Sandler, was a Polish Catholic social worker who saved the lives of over 2,500 children of the Warsaw Ghetto during the war. The famous play “Life in a Jar” was written about her. Irena

is a very good example of responsible concern put into action. She was not indifferent!

Here is an example of how I had to use Wiesel's message in my own life. Recently I witnessed a very angry man verbally abusing three small children in a local toy store. He raised his hand and charged at them. The traumatized children saw my concern. An employee working nearby ignored the incident. It occurred to me that these children could be in danger at home. I told the store manager but she was indifferent. The store might lose a customer. But what about the children, I thought over and over? I took the man's license plate number and reported it to the police. It was all I could do. The children were innocent and precious and I knew the angry man needed to get help

Our Polish Christian heritage teaches us to support the victim and not the oppressor. I was reminded of that by Elie Wiesel.
