Seek Area Agents We have been directed by our Board to

assure current members of services available through out organization and also concentrate on recruiting new members. Records indicate that many of our members do not have sufficient coverage for needs typically required later in life. There are others who have family members without coverage and we are obliged to serve our membership by keeping them fully informed.

Area Agents will be assigned, under contract. in sections where such services are needed. We are licensed in PA, Ill. and NJ and opportunities are potentially available in those states.

Initially our plan is to have designated agents from within our ranks provide this service. Beyond the proscribed scope of service, Area Agents will also have the opportunity to recruit new members from the general population. Licensed Agents affiliated with Polish Union are eligible to apply. 



2012-2013 Scholarship Eligibility Requirements

CHANGES HAVE BEEN MADE - PLEASE READ THIS THOROUGHLY

1. If All Eligibility Requirements listed below are met then the Approved Applicant will receive a grant as follows:

• Insured for between \$5,000 and \$7,499 of insurance will receive a grant of \$200 dollars.

• Insured for between \$7,500 and \$9,999 of insurance will receive a grant of \$300 dollars.

• Insured for between \$10,000 and \$14,999 of insurance will receive a grant of \$400 dollars.

• Insured for between \$15,000 and \$19,999 of insurance will receive a grant of \$600 dollars.

• Insured for \$20,000 or more of insurance will receive a grant of \$800 dollars.

2. Applicant must be an Insured Member of the Polish Union of U.S.A. in good standing (paid to date) for a Minimum of Five (5) years and carry a Minimum of \$5,000 of Polish Union of U.S.A. Permanent Life Insurance (excludes term).

3. Applicant must be a High School Graduate or Higher, entering the 2013 Fall Term/Semester, and must be a Full Time

Student (minimum of 12 Term/Semester Hours).

Applicant must Submit; School Verification from the University, College, Graduate, Business, Nursing or Trade School that they will be attending in the 2013 Fall Term/Semester. This Verification may be a Letter of Admission, a Class Schedule, a Bill, etc.; But it must have the Schools Name, the Students Name, and it must show they will be attending the 2013 Fall Term/Semester. 7. The Scholarship Application and Essay **Deadline is May 31, 2013**. They must be Postmarked no later than May 31, 2013. Any received with a postmark after this date will not be eligible or considered.

The School Verification will be accepted under separate cover to allow for additional time to acquire, But it must be received no later than July 31, 2013.

8. Scholarship Grants are given to each approved Applicant once per school year with a lifetime limit of four times. Scholarship Grant checks are issued and sent to the applicant, with the understanding that it will be applied toward applicant's tuition, or supplies.

9. Polish Union accepts no responsibility for decreases of other grants or loan amounts due to the awarding of the Polish Union Scholarship Grant to the student. Students are solely responsible for all aspects of their financial aid status and, thus, should be aware of the consequences of applying for a Polish Union Scholarship Grant.

A Polish Buffet

The next time you entertain, at home or in a banquet hall, combine the American style buffet supper with any of the following treats for an authentic Buffet Polski (which is also easy to pronounce: Boo-fett polski).

Cold Meat Platter

On lettuce-lined platter artistically arrange slices of boiled ham smoked Polish sausage (regular, hunter's krakowska, Canadian bacon, roast port loin, pasztet (pate), etc.)

Relish Tray

should include prepared horseradish~Cwikla:(beet and horseradish relish), marinated mushrooms, dill pickles, spiced plums (sliwki w occie), radishes. Provide rye bread and unsalted butter.

Eggs In Mustard Sauce

Place hard-cooked eggs cut-side down on platter. Drench with sauce made (for 12 eggs) by fork blending 2 c. sour cream with 4-5 T. sharp brown mustard, I T. vinegar, I t. salt and 2 T. sugar (or more to taste).

Herring Salad Polonaise

Drain store-bought marinated herring (the kind that comes in jars, but not the creamed variety), cut into bite-sized pieces. Combine 3 c. cut-up drained herring with 2-3 chopped onions and 2 coarsely grated, peeled cooking apples. Dress with sauce made by fork blending I to 2 c. sour cream with 1 T. sharp brown mustard and 1 T. sugar. Garnish with chopped radishes and green onions.

Vegetable Salad Combine 5 c. cold cooked potatoes, diced with 2 c. chopped dill pickles, 2 cans drained peas and carrots, 2 coarsely grated, peeled cooking apples, I can drained white beans, 1/2 c. chopped pickled plums (if available, spiced peaches may be used). Salt and pepper to taste and dress with slaw dressing, mayonnaise or a combination of mayonnaise and sour cream. Garnish with chopped chives.

Pea Salad

Combine 4 cans drained peas with I c. chopped pickles and 4-6 chopped hard-cooked eggs. Dress with any of the sauces suggested for herring polonaise or vegetable salad above.

Bigos

Put leftover cooked meat, (roasts, steaks, chops, ham, poultry, etc.) into cubes and freeze. When enough has accumulated, you're ready to make bigos. Rinse 5 Ibs. sauerkraut in plenty of water, drain, squeeze dry and chop. Cook in 3 c. water along with 1 onion 2 chopped, peeled cooking apples and 2-3 dried Polish mushrooms (soaked several hours in 1 c. water and chopped) plus the mushroom water, for about 1 hour. Meanwhile, simmer 2-3 chopped onions in lard until transparent, and 4-5 Ibs. cubed leftover meat 1 lb. or more skinned smoked kielbasa, diced, and simmer-under cover 30 mins. stirring and adding a little water if needed. Combine sauerkraut with meat, add 2 c. chopped pitted prunes, place in roaster and bake covered in med. oven 3 hrs.-Salt and~pepper to taste. I c. dark beer or dry red wine may' be added. Prepare at least 2 days in advance. Serve with rye bread. Ice-cold vodka is a great go-together!

Dear Jasmine:




