

Christmas in Wambierzyce The Most Famous Nativity Scene in Poland



Wambierzyce, a small town in southwestern Poland surrounded picturesque Mountains, is called the Silesian Jerusalem, and it is one of the most popular destinations for pilgrims in Poland, after Czestochowa and Kalwaria Zebrzydowska. The layout of the town is modeled after Jerusalem, the Holy City, and the surrounding hills are called Mount Zion, Mount Sinai, Tabor, and Golgotha. The town is overshadowed by the magnificent Basilica of the Visitation of Our

Lady that dates back to the 13th century, making it the oldest pilgrimage destination in Poland.

The facade of the Basilica was renovated in the Baroque Style in the 19th century and an extensive Calvary with 130 stations of the cross was also built in the 19th century. The route of the Calvary starts at the Basilica, then continues, winding over the hills and ending at the top of Golgotha. The Passion Play attracts many pilgrims and tourists every year to Wambierzyce during Holy Week. But the town is most famous for its impressive Nativity Scene which was carved out of wood by a local carpenter called Witting in the 19th century. The Nativity is composed of 800 intricately carved figures, 500 of which are moveable (see photo on cover).




The Basilica is home to the miraculous statue of Our Lady of Wambierzyce. In contrast to her magnificent surroundings, the simple 13th-century statue of Our Lady, carved out of linden wood, is tiny and unadorned, but she has been credited with many miracles over hundreds of years. In 1980 Pope John Paul II named her the Patroness of Families.

Pilgrims from Poland, Germany, the Czech Republic, and other

European countries flock to the town all year long, not just at Easter for the Passion Play or at Christmas to see the famous moveable creche. But it is during December that the town sparkles the most and the pride of Wambierzyce, the beautiful creche, inspires and amazes thousands of visitors. If you are ever in Poland during the Holiday Season, be sure to add a visit to Wambierzyce to your itinerary.

Wigilijne desery

Polish Christmas Pudding

Kutia is an old recipe that comes to us from the Ukraine, Belarus, Lithuania, and Eastern Poland; it is one of the oldest and most traditional of Wigila recipes. In ancient times, kutia was served on All Saints' Day (November 1st), and its presence on Wigilia tables stems from the tradition of honoring the dead at the time of the winter solstice. Kutia must contain three basic ingredients: grains, poppyseed, and honey, but there is no one single recipe for kutia – each family has its own favorite – some prefer it less thick and add cream to it before

serving. In many Polish homes, kutia is a musthave for Wiglia, along with barszcz, herring, and mushroom dishes.

Ingredients:

1 cup wheat berries (or barley), 1 cup poppy seeds, 1 1/4 cups of the following mixture: slivered almonds, chopped walnuts, chopped dried figs or dates, yellow raisins (pre-soaked), candied orange peel (chopped), 1 cup honey, 1 cup milk, and 1 cup heavy cream (for serving)

Directions:

Soak wheat berries in two cups of hot water overnight. Drain, place in pot, cover with cold water, and cook until soft (about two hours), adding more water as needed. When wheat berries are soft, drain and let cool. Cook poppy seeds in a small pot covered with milk diluted with a little water for 45 minutes over low heat. Drain and grind seeds in batches in a coffee grinder until very soft and milky. Warm honey and add to poppy seeds; add nuts and dried fruit. Mix with wheat berries and chill. Serve with cream on the side.

Dried Fruit Compote

The perfect dessert to serve after Wigilia, a true Polish Christmas tradition. Tastes best if prepared the day before.

Ingredients:

1 cup dried prunes, 1 cup dried figs or apricots, 1 cup dried apples, 1 cup dried pears, 8 - 10 cloves, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 tsp ground cinnamon, juice of 1 lemon, peel of 1 lemon, cut into strips

Directions:

Rinse dried fruits and soak in warm water for 15 minutes. (You can substitute your favorite dried fruits for any in this recipe.)
Place in a large pot and cover with warm water. Add cloves and cinnamon and cook for one hour. Add sugar, washed lemon peel, and lemon juice, and bring to a gentle boil.
Taste and add more sugar or lemon juice as needed.
Chill before serving. You can add fresh orange slices to the compote (peel left on) for garnish.

Kutia

Kutia jest tradycyjna potrawa ukraińskiej, białoruskiej, litewskiej i dawnej polskiej kuchni kresowej; jest jedna z najdawniejszych jadanych w Polsce wigilijnych potraw. W zamierzchłej przeszłości spożywano ją na stypach zadusznych, zatem jej obecność podczas Wigilii jest reliktem dawnych obrzędów ku czci zmarłych, odprawianych przed wiekami w dzień zimowego przesilenia. Wedlug starej tradycji kutia musi zawierac trzy podstawowe składniki: zboże, mak i miód. Nie istnieje jeden przepis na kutie, a wiec co dom, to obyczaj. Jedni dodają więcej bakalii, inni

cukru i miodu, Jedni podają ją rzadszą inni gęściejszą. W wielu domach w Święta Bożego Narodzenia kutia musi się znaleźć na stole, tak samo jak barszcz, śledź, czy potrawy z suszonych grzybów.

Składniki:

250 g obłuskanej pszenicy lub peczaku (kaszy jeczmiennej – barley), 250 g maku, 300 g bakalii: obranych migdałów, orzechów włoskich, laskowych, rodzynek, fig, daktyli, smażonej skórki pomarańczowej, 250 g miodu, szklanka mleka, śmietanka do rozrzedzenia kutii.

Wykonanie:

Dobrze umytą, namoczoną poprzedniego dnia pszenicę (lub pęczak albo grubą kaszę jeczmienną) gotujemy w dużej ilości wody, aż do miękkości; w przypadku pszenicy zmieniamy kilkakrotnie wodę podczas gotowania. Po ugotowaniu odcedzamy na sicie. Umyty mak zalewamy mlekiem rozcieńczonym wodą i gotujemy przez 45 minut na małym ogniu, odcedzamy, po czym mielimy 3-4 razy. Łączymy mak z rozgrzanym miodem, dodajemy pszenice (lub peczak) i bakalie, dokładnie mieszamy i wstawiamy w chłodne miejsce. Rozrzedzamy śmietanką przed podaniem.

Kompot z suszu

Doskonały na zakończenie wigilijnej wieczerzy. Prawdziwie świąteczny. Najlepszy, kiedy ugotowany dzień wcześniej.

Składniki:

20 dag suszonych śliwek, 20 dag suszonych fig, 20 dag suszonych jabłek, 20 dag suszonych gruszek, goździki, 1/2 szklanki cukru, łyżeczka mielonego cynamonu, skórka z cytryny

Wykonanie:

Owoce opłukać i namoczyć przez 15 minut w ciepłej wodzie . Następnie włożyć je do garnka, zalać gorącą wodą. Dorzucić 8-10 goździków i cynamon. Gotować ponad godzinę. Dodać cukier oraz (umytą!) pokrojoną w plasterki całą cytrynę (wraz ze skórką). Sprawdzić smak kompotu. Jeśli to

konieczne, dodać jeszcze cukier lub cytrynę. Do dekoracji można użyć pokrojonej w plastry pomarańczy (ze skórką)

Kto był żyw , do kościoła ciągnął , ostały ino po chałupach całkiem stare, chore albo kaleki. Już z daleka widniały rozgorzałe okna kościelne i główne drzwi na oścież wywarte, a światłem buchające, naród zaś płynął przez nie i płynął jak woda, z wolna zapełniając wnętrze (...) A dopiero przed druga mszą , kiej już naród skruszał nieco modleniem, huknęły znowu organy i ksiądz zaśpiewał: W żłobie leży , któż pobieży. Naród się zakołysał, powstał z klęczek, wraz też pochwycił nutę i pełnymi piersiami, a z mocą ryknął jednym głosem: Kolędować Małemu! Vivere est cogitare – Żyć to znaczy myśleć (Cyceron)

Corocznie, w trzeci czwartek listopada obchodzony jest, z iniciatywy UNESCO, Miedzynarodowy Dzień Filozofii. Obchody mają na celu wykazanie znaczenia filozofii i zachęcenie do krytycznego myślenia i debaty filozoficznej nad problemami współczesnego świata. Dyskutowane w tym czasie zagadnienia dotyczą najbardziej żywotnych problemów, z którymi próbuje uporać się współczesny człowiek, a to, między innymi, zagadnienia takie jak: szczęście, tolerancja, równouprawnienie kobiet, życie i śmierć, wiara i ateizm, człowieczeństwo.

Samo słowo "Filozofia" ma grecki rodowód i oznacza mniej więcej "umiłowanie mądrości" (phileo – kochać, sophia – mądrość). W starożytności nie było podziału między filozofią a nauką – wszelka wiedza była uznawana za filozofię. Taki stan rzeczy utrzymywał się właściwie do XVIII wieku, kiedy z filozofii wyłoniły się samodzielne dziedziny wiedzy w postaci znanych nam dzisiaj nauk.

Właściwie rozumiane rozważania filozoficzne dotycza przede wszystkim istoty i struktury bytu, źródeł, narzędzi i prawomocności poznania, zasad wartościowania, sensu życia i sposobów jego godnego prowadzenia.

Ze względu na różne przedmioty zainteresowań, filozofie dzieli się zwykle na kilka podstawowych działów, i tak główne obszary badań filozoficznych to: Metafizyka, zwana też Ontologią, Epistemologia, czyli Teoria poznania, Aksjologia, Antropologia filozoficzna i Logika. Rozróżnia się także Filozofię Państwa, Prawa, Przyrody i Nauki.

Filozofowie polscy

W średniowieczu filozofia i nauka polska rozwijały się w szkołach klasztornych. Pierwszym szeroko znanym w Europie polskim filozofem był Witelon (XIII w.) - mnich, fizyk, matematyk, filozof, optyk, twórca podstaw psychologii spostrzegania. Jego rozprawę o optyce i fizjologii widzenia znali między innymi Leonardo da Vinci, Mikołaj Kopernik i Johannes Kepler. Jako filozof, Witelon podzielał poglądy św. Augustyna. Przełomem dla rozwoju filozofii w Polsce było powstanie Uniwersytetu Krakowskiego w 1364, a zwłaszcza jego odnowienie w 1400 r. W wieku XV, za sprawa filozofa Grzegorza z Sanoka, dotarł do Polski Humanizm – główny prąd intelektualny epoki renesansu - ruch filozoficzny, kulturalny i moralny, koncentrujący uwagę na godności i wolności człowieka. Wybitnym przedstawicielem filozofii tego okresu jest Paweł Włodkowic, prekursor prawa międzynarodowego, który głosił, że jednostki i narody są równe i wolne. Najsławniejszym umysłem tego okresu był niewatpliwie Mikołaj Kopernik; nie był on wprawdzie filozofem, ale jego teoria heliocentryczna nie tylko przyczyniła się do rozwoju nowej metodologii nauk przyrodniczych, ale także miała wielkie konsekwencje filozoficzne, ponieważ zmieniała spojrzenie na miejsce Ziemi i człowieka we wszechświecie.

W wieku XVI i XVII szczególne znaczenie w skali Europy zyskała polska filozofia państwa. Głównym przedstawicielem myśli politycznej w tych czasach był Andrzej Frycz Modrzewski, autor sławnego dzieła "O Poprawie Rzeczypospolitej", który pierwszy postulował zrównanie wszystkich grup społecznych (szlachty, mieszczaństwa i chłopstwa) w prawach i opowiadał się za protekcjonizmem w gospodarce, opieka państwa nad ubogimi i publicznym szkolnictwem. Dużą sławą cieszyli się także tacy myśliciele i pisarze jak: Stanisław Orzechowski, Łukasz Górnicki oraz Wawrzyniec Goślicki.

Lata 1650-1750 nie należały do najlepszych w historii polskiej kultury, w tym filozofii. Niemniej jednak, trzeba wymienić Adama Kochańskiego, z którym korespondował Leibniz, i Marcina Śmigleckiego, autora podręcznika logiki, szeroko znanego w Oxfordzie.

XVIII wieku do Rzeczypospolitej przeniknęły idee europejskiego oświecenia. Wielkie ożywienie intelektualne zaowocowało wieloma dziełami o kapitalnym znaczeniu dla Polski. Komisja Edukacji Narodowej stale współpracowała z myślicielami francuskimi, a najwybitniejszymi przedstawicielami oświecenia w polskiej filozofii byli: Jan Śniadecki (1756-1830), empirysta, Jędrzej Śniadecki, przedstawiciel filozofii "zdrowego rozsądku", która na poczatku XIX w. zdominowala polskie uniwersytety, oraz Stanisław Staszic (1755-1826) i Hugo Kołłątaj(1750-1812), którzy na ideach oświeceniowych

opierali pracę nad rozwojem kraju.

W wieku XIX, a szczególnie między powstaniami (1830) - 1863) rozwija się nurt filozofii zwany Mesjanizmem polskim. Dwaj szeroko znani reprezentanci tej polskiej filozofii narodowej to Józef Hoene-Wroński i August Cieszkowski. Według Hoene-Wrońskiego, powołaniem ludzkości jest przejście do ustroju rozumnego, w którym nastąpi zjednoczenie dobra i prawdy oraz religii i nauki.

Mesjaszem, który wprowadzi ludzkość w okres szczęśliwości, jest w jego koncepcji filozofia. Głównym popularyzatorem tej myśli był Mickiewicz, tyle że Mesjaszem miała być Polska. Podobnie, według mesjanistycznej koncepcji Cieszkowskiego, naród polski został powołany do przebudowy społeczno-moralnej rzeczywistości współczesnej.

Do myślicieli okresu pozytywizmu (2 poł. XIX w.) należeli: Aleksander Świętochowski, Julian Ochorowicz i Adolf Dygasiński. Znaną i zasłużoną postacią w filozofii przełomu XIX i XX w.był Kazimierz Twardowski - polski filozof, psycholog i twórca lwowsko-warszawskiej szkoły filozofii. Szkoła, zapoczątkowana we Lwowie i rozwijana przez uczniów Twardowskiego w Warszawie, była liczącym się na świecie ośrodkiem myśli filozoficznej i logicznej.

Tuż przed wybuchem II wojny światowej grupa filozofów skupionych wokół szkoły liczyła kilkadziesiąt osób pracujących w tak różnych dziedzinach filozofii i nauk pokrewnych jak logika matematyczna, psychologia, socjologia, lingwistyka teoretyczna, historia sztuki i literatura. Wybuch II wojny i zmiany terytorialne oznaczały jednocześnie kres jej istnienia; jednak wpływ szkoły i jej metodologii trwał nadal poprzez jej kontynuatorów. Sukcesorami szkoły byli najsłynniejsi współczesni filozofowie polscy: Kazimierz Ajdukiewicz, Tadeusz Kotarbiński, Stanisław Leśniewski, Jan Łukasiewicz, Alfred Tarski, Zygmunt Zawirski, Tadeusz Czeżowski, Władysław Witwicki, Maria Ossowska, Stanisław Ossowski, Władysław Tatarkiewicz i Izydora Dambska.
