

## AN EVENING OF REMEMBRANCE WORLD WAR II SURVIVORS SHARE THEIR STORIES

On Friday, November 2, 2012, Council 27 and Group 114 presented a very special evening called "Preserving Their Memories: Survivors of WW II Tell Their Stories." Three Christian survivors of Word War II, shared their dramatic stories with PWA members and guests at the PWA Home Office Social Hall.

The three survivors scheduled to speak were Barbara Ciepiela of Group 114, Helena Nowicka of Group 211, and Constantine Trela. Unfortunatley, Barbara Ciepiela was hospitalized a few days before the event, so Krystyna Nowobilski was invited to take her place at the last minute; she was kind enough to share with the audience her story of banishment and exile as a WW II survivor on very short notice.

Council 27 President Bo Padowski welcomed the guests and turned the microphone over to Teresa Makowski, President of Group 114 and one of the main organizers of the evening. Mrs. Makowski gave a brief overview of Poland's long history of persecution by its neighbors – Russia from the east and Germany from the west. The two foes of Poland united in the early days of World War II to invade Poland and both countries, Nazi Germany under Hitler and the Soviet Union under Stalin, began their systematic purges of the Polish population in what amounted to a genocide of the Polish people.

The three survivors' stories brought that history to life. Moderator Janusz Kopec interviewed them, asking questions about their lives and the events of the years from 1939 to 1945, when the war finally ended and all three of them found themselves in safety and freedom once again. The interviews were conducted in Polish, and *Glos Polek* editor Mary Piergies (Group 693) acted as interpreter, summarizing in English the questions and answers for those members of the audience who did not understand Polish. Maria Pawlik of Group 114 contributed her acting skills to the solemn atmosphere of the evening by reading poems and documents from the time. Ryszard Makowski provided the musical background, which included songs and hymns that Polish refugees and POWs composed during the many years of exile from their homeland.

Helena Nowicka was 14 when Soviet soldiers came to her home in Eastern Poland in the middle of the night and deported the entire family to Siberia, where they lived and worked in labor camps in subhuman conditions. The family's long journey then took them to Iran, India, Australia, New Zealand, and Mexico before Helena finally came to the United States where she

married, started a family, and became a very active member of PWA.

Krystyna Nowobilski's story was similar. Her father was an officer in the Polish Army and it was only luck that saved him from being captured and executed in Katyn. Krystyna (age 7), her mother, and her two older sisters were also deported to Siberia and their journey subsequently took them to Iran, Africa, and England, before she and her husband emigrated to the United States in 1950, where she started a family and became an artist. Her love of Africa, where she first attended school, continues to resonate through her life and her art.

Constantine Trela, father of Secretary-Treasurer Antoinette Trela, was a young soldier in the Polish Army when World War II broke out, and he took part in some of the very first battles of the war, before becoming a German POW. After his release, he joined the Polish underground, was captured again, and sent to Nazi concentration camps before being liberated by the Allied Forces and finally able to start a new life as an immigrant in the United States. Mr. Trela's son-in-law, John Schoen, read a summary of his wartime experiences, and then Mr. Trela answered questions posed by the moderator.

The stories made us cry and they made us laugh as the survivors recalled some of the touching moments in their journeys and some of the ways they and their families were able to keep their humanity and their hope alive in spite of the hardships they had to endure.

It was a memorable evening and sincere thanks are expressed to Council 27, Group 114, and all of the organizers of the event for such an emotional and unforgettable experience. Organizers included Bo Padowski, Teresa Makowski, Halina Wisniewski, and Ania Holmberg. We express our gratitude to Mrs. Nowicka, Mrs. Nowobilski, and Mr. Trela for their courage and for their generosity in sharing their stories with us ... and for bringing this forgotten chapter of Poland's history to life. We wish Mrs. Ciepiela a speedy recovery and a return to full health, and we hope that she will be able to share with us her story of Siberian exile and long journey to the United States another time in the near future.

National President Delphine Huneycutt and Honorary President Virginia Sikora made a few remarks at the end of the evening. Vice President Sharon Zago and Secretary-Treasurer Antoinette Trela were also in attendance.

- A District can be awarded only once.
- Awarded funds to be used for the District's Youth Activities and/or Scholarship Fund.
- Winners will be announced in the first issue of Glos Polek in 2014.

## **POLISH EASTER TRADITIONS**

Polish Easter traditions are as old and beautiful as Polish Christmas traditions and they require just as much elaborate preparation. These traditions celebrate not only the central mystery of the Catholic faith, the Resurrection of Jesus Christ, they also celebrate the coming of spring and the long-awaited rebirth and renewal of nature after the long, dark months of winter. The Polish name for Easter is Wielkanoc, which means Great Night – the night from Holy Saturday to Easter Sunday – when the miracle of the Resurrection took place.



Lent or *Wielki Post* is the six-week period of religious preparation for Easter. Before the fasting that is a part of Lent, everyone enjoys one last week of merrymaking and good food. This is called Fat Week or *Thusty Tydzień*. It starts on the Thursday before Ash Wednesday, when costume parties are held and millions of the famous jelly doughnuts called *pączki* are baked and consumed. In the United States, *pączki* are eaten on Fat Tuesday, also known as Mardi Gras, but in Poland these delicacies are a part of weeklong celebration that leads up to Ash Wednesday.



On Ash Wednesday people go to church for ashes and they also cut pussy willow branches, called *bazie* or *kotki* and place them in water, in the hope that they will bloom by Palm Sunday. The six weeks of Lent, leading to Easter Sunday, are a time of fasting and prayer. Stations of the Cross and *Gorzkie Żale* are two religious traditions observed during Lent. *Gorzkie Żale*, which means Bitter Sorrows, are beautiful hymns or lamentations that are sung on Friday evenings and Sunday afternoons in Lent. These are ancient chants, retracing the Passion and Crucifixion, and their soulful notes ring out of all churches in cities and villages in Poland during Lent.



Palm Sunday, *Niedziela Palmowa*, begins Holy Week when preparations for Easter can start in earnest. Since palms do not grow in Poland, people take pussywillow branches to church to be blessed by the priest on Palm Sunday, or sprigs of colored straw. The branches and sprigs are then hung in houses, usually tucked behind a holy picture, to bring health and prosperity to the household during the coming year.



Holy Week, *Wielki Tydzień*, includes spiritual and other preparations for Easter. Homes are cleaned, curtains washed, and the baking and cooking begins. In olden times, ham and sausages were made and smoked at home, and bread and other pastries were baked from scratch. The baking tradition continues today and tall airy *babki*, flat colorful shortbread cakes called *mazurki*, and rich creamy cheesecakes or *serniki* are lovingly prepared. Each housewife wants to have a large selection of homemade pastries to place on her Easter table. Easter eggs, called *pisanki*, are also made during Holy Week.



On Holy Thursday, people go to church for a service that commemorates the Last Supper. The priest washes the feet of twelve parishioners and repeats the actions and words of Jesus Christ, starting the celebration of the Passion that will take place over the next three days. On Holy Friday, after 3 p.m., which is the time that Jesus died on the cross, each church sets up a tomb where the Holy Eucharist is placed as well as a statue of Jesus taken down from the cross. Parishioners stand guard at the tomb all night as people come and pray. Many people go from village to village and, in the city, from church to church to pray at the tombs, called *groby*. No baking is allowed on Holy Friday, but people spend time coloring Easter eggs and preparing baskets to be blessed in church on Holy Saturday.




The most colorful additions to Polish Easter baskets are the Easter eggs, called *pisanki*. There are many different names for Easter eggs in Poland, depending on the method that is used to make them. In addition to the eggs, a Polish Easter basket includes sausage or ham, bread, butter, salt, and horseradish. The eggs symbolize life, spring, and the Resurrection. Bread represents Christ, the bread of life. The sausage or ham represent

abundance and God's generosity. The horseradish represents the passion of Christ and salt symbolizes prosperity. Butter represents good will and the decorations of green sprigs, pussy willows, or daffodils represent joy. People all over Poland walk with their Easter baskets in hand to church on Holy Saturday, where a priest blesses them with holy water, and then they go straight home to try some of the blessed food, which tastes all the more delicious after weeks of fasting during Lent.



On Sunday morning, a beautifully laid table is prepared and covered with pisanki, ham, sausage, cold meats, salads and relishes, including *ćwikla*, made with grated beets and horseradish, bread, *babki*, *mazurki*, and other pastries, and, in the center, a lamb made of butter or sugar, commemorating the resurrected Christ. No smoke was permitted on Easter Sunday so no warm food was served, other than *żur*, the traditional sour soup that is a must on the Easter menu. Easter Brunch is called *Święconka*, which means blessed food, since many of the items served on Easter Sunday had been blessed in church on Holy Saturday.

The Easter Brunch starts with the sharing of a blessed egg; everyone takes a piece of the egg from the head of the household as they exchange best wishes with one another.



On Easter Monday the water consumption in Poland shoots way up and this is due to an ancient custom that is still observed today, in villages and cities alike. It is called *Śmigus Dyngus* or Wet Monday when people sprinkle each other with water on the day after Easter, or, in the case of young people, they don't sprinkle but douse each other with buckets of water. Boys lie in wait to surprise young girls to see who can get whom wet first! In extreme cases, you might even be thrown into a stream of cold water with all your clothes on! The custom of pouring water is an ancient spring rite of cleansing, purification, and fertility that is practiced

all over the world, from Europe to China. In Poland it takes on a religious meaning since, according to legend, Prince Mieszko I, the first king of Poland, was married and baptized on Easter Monday in the year 966 AD. He had the entire nation of Poland christened on his wedding day as well, and Poland has been a deeply religious country ever since, for over one thousand years.

## **Easter Recipes**

Wielkanocne przepisy

The Polish Easter table features not only a ham as its centerpiece, but a wide variety of other meats as well – roasts, pates, and sausage – and sometimes a roasted goose or duck makes an appearance for an added festive touch. The recipe below is for a duck roasted with apples. The second recipe is for Polish Easter ham salad.

Nie tylko szynka bywa głównym przysmakiem na polskim stole wielkanocnym, ale także inne mięsa – pieczeń, pasztet, kiełbasa, a często gęś pieczona albo kaczka są podawane jako to najważniejsze i celebrowane świąteczne danie. Poniżej podany przepis to kaczka pieczona z jabłkami. Następny przepis to polska sałatka z dodatkiem wielkanocnej szynki.

#### **Roast Duck with Apples**

#### Kaczka z jabłkami

#### **Ingredients:**

#### Składniki:

1 duck, about 4 to 4 1/2 lbs, 1 tablespoon tarragon, 1 tablespoon marjoram, salt and pepper, 2-3 tablespoons olive oil, 2 Granny Smith apples unpeeled 1 kaczka, o wadze około 2 kg, 1 łyżka suszonego estragonu, 1 łyżka suszonego majeranku, sól i pieprz, 2-3 łyżki oliwy z oliwek, 2 kwaśne jabłka ze skórką

#### **Directions:**

#### Wykonanie:

A frozen duck should be defrosted in the refrigerator for 24 hours. After it thaws, take out the baa with aiblets and neck from the inside of the duck (they will not be used in this recipe). Rinse the duck, pat dry, and rub inside and out with olive oil, salt, pepper, tarragon, and marjoram. Stuff the cavity with cored, quartered, and unpeeled Granny Smith apples. Close the cavity with toothpicks or sew it together with kitchen twine.



Mrożona kaczkę najlepiej rozmrozić wkładając ją do lodówki na 24 godziny. Po rozmrożeniu wyjąć z wnętrza kaczki woreczek z podrobami (podroby w tym przepisie nie będą wykorzystane). Kaczkę wysmarować oliwą z oliwek, natrzeć solg, pieprzem, majerankiem i estragonem. Do środka kaczki włożyć 2 jabłka pokrojonego na ćwiartki z wykrojonymi gniazdami nasiennymi. Otwór spiąć wykałaczkami lub zaszyć nicia kuchenna.

Preheat the oven to 450 degrees F. Place duck on a steel rack in an uncovered roasting pan or large ovenproof casserole, add 1 cup of water, place in preheated oven, and bake for 30 minutes. Cover the roasting pan or casserole, reduce heat to 325 degrees F, and bake the duck for another 2 hours. Take duck out of the oven when the juices run clear when the skin is pierced. Cut off legs, wings, and breasts and serve on a warmed platter with roasting juices and apples from the pan. Serve immediately. Extra duck fat can be saved and used for roasting potatoes or to make a spread. Serves 4.

Piekarnik nagrzać do 230 stopni. Do żaroodpornego garnka lub naczynia włożyć metalową kratkę, na której ułożyć kaczkę. Dodać szklankę wody i wstawić do nagrzanego piekarnika (narazie bez pokrywki) i piec przez 1/2 godziny. Następnie zamknąć garnek pokrywą, zmniejszyć temperaturę do 180 stopni i piec przez 2 godziny. Wyjąć kaczkę z garnka, odkroić udka, skrzydełka i piersi, ułożyć je na podgrzanych talerzach, można polać wytopionym tłuszczem. Tłuszcz z kaczki można zachować i użyć np. do podsmażania ziemniaków lub sporządzenia smarowidła z pieczonego mięsa.



## POZNAJCIE LUDOLFINĘ, NAJSŁYNNIEJSZĄ LICZBĘ

("Pi razy oko" albo "Pi razy drzwi"\* czyli 3,141592653589793238462643383 27950288419716939937510...)

14 marca entuzjaści nauk ścisłych, matematycy, studenci i uczniowie w wielu krajach świata celebrują liczbę Pi. Datę tych obchodów wybrano nieprzypadkowo; w Stanach Zjednoczonych zapisuje się ją jako 3.14, co właśnie stanowi przybliżoną wartość owej ważnej i tajemniczej liczby. Na uroczystości składają się wykłady, różnego rodzaju konkursy, gry i zabawy logiczne, prezentacje symulacji komputerowych, pokazy eksperymentów fizycznych, których celem jest upowszechnianie wiedzy o naukach ścisłych, no i oczywiście dobra rozrywka. Po raz pierwszy dzień liczby Pi obchodzono w 1988 r. w muzeum nauki Exploratorium w San Francisco.

Liczba Pi jest liczbą niewymierną, to znaczy taką, której rozwinięcie dziesiętne jest nieskończone. Jest także tzw. stałą matematyczną, tzn. symbolem, któremu przyporządkowana jest określona, zdefiniowana wartość. W wypadku Pi jest to stosunek długości okręgu do długości jego średnicy, i wynosi on 3,141592... i "biegnie" w nieskończoność. Liczba Pi jest wykorzystywana prawie w każdej sytuacji, w której musimy dokonać pomiarów przy pomocy sfer, koła czy okręgu i pojawia się w wielu dziedzinach matematyki i fizyki. O tym jak bardzo ważną rolę odgrywa ta liczba w określeniu naszej "ziemskiej i kosmicznej rzeczywistości" może świadczyć fakt, ze uczeni, szukając kontaktu z cywilizacjami pozaziemskimi, wysłali w kosmos drogą radiową informację o wartości liczby Pi, wierząc, że inteligentne istoty spoza Ziemi znają tę liczbę także i rozpoznają nasz komunikat.

Ta najsłynniejsza w matematyce stała od czasów starożytnych fascynuje kolejne pokolenia badaczy. Już w starożytności zauważono, że wszystkie koła mają ze soba coś wspólnego, a mianowicie że ich średnica i obwód pozostają wobec siebie zawsze w takim samym stosunku, i że wartość liczbowa wyrażająca tę zależność jest bliska 3. Najstarsze próby oszacowania wartości liczby Pi pochodzą z Babilonu. Na tablicy datowanej na lata 1900-1700 p.n.e. pojawia się jej przybliżona wartość jako 3,125. W Chinach około 1200 p.n.e początkowo przyjmowano, że Pi =3, a potem przybliżano ją jako kwadratowy pierwiastek z 10. Warto również odnotować fakt, że w piramidzie Cheopsa stosunek sumy dwóch boków podstawy do wysokości wynosi 3,1416. W Grecji zajmowali się tą liczbą Archimedes i Euklides. W 1610 roku, holenderski matematyk Ludolf van Ceulen obliczył wartość liczby Pi z dokładnościa do 35 cyfr po przecinku, co w tamtych czasach było ogromnym wyczynem; to właśnie na jego cześć nazwano Pi "ludolfina". Z biegiem lat uzyskiwano coraz lepsze przybliżenia wartości π sięgające kilkuset miejsc po przecinku.

Od 1949, kiedy to przy pomocy komputera ENIAC obliczono 2037 miejsc po przecinku, dokładniejsze aproksymacje liczby π uzyskiwano już tylko przy użyciu komputerów. 31 grudnia 2009 r. Fabrice Bellard ogłosił, że udało mu się obliczyć π z dokładnością do 2 699 999 990 000 miejsc po przecinku. Gdybyśmy każdej sekundy recytowali jedną cyfrę, dokładne przeczytanie znanej teraz liczby Pi zajęłoby nam aż 85 tys. lat! W roku 2010 obliczono cyfrę będącą 2 000 000 000 000 000 cyfrą liczby Pi i wynosi ona zero. Notowane są też rekordy w zapamiętywaniu cyfr liczby Pi. Japończyk, Hideaki Tomoyori, zapamietał 40 000 cyfr i wymieniał je (oczywiście w prawidłowej kolejności) przez 17 godzin. Inny Japończyk, Akira Haraguchi, wyrecytował 100 000 cyfr w ciagu 16 godzin. Zapamiętanie nawet kilkunastu początkowych cyfr po przecinku nie jest sprawą łatwą. Umiarkowanym entuziastom takiego hobby może przyjść z pomocą poezja; bowiem zdarza się, że poeci lub po prostu pasjonaci układają wiersze, w których słowach ilość liter wyraża nastepujące po sobie cyfry.



Natomiast inny wiersz, który jest już tylko poetycką refleksją na temat Pi, wyraża niezwykłość i tajemniczość liczby, która wydaje się "wiązać" świat w możliwą do pojęcia całość:

"Korowód cyfr składających się na liczbę Pi nie zatrzymuje się na brzegu kartki, potrafi ciągnąć się po stole, przez powietrze, przez mur, liść, gniazdo ptasie, chmury, prosto w niebo,

przez całą nieba wzdętość i bezdenność."

## 150. Rocznica Powstania Styczniowego (1863 – 1864)



"O podnieśmy w górę czoła, serca wznieśmy nasze. A gdy na nas kraj zawoła, podnieśmy pałasze."

(z pieśni powstanców 1863 r.)

Powstanie Styczniowe – najdłużej trwające z polskich powstań narodowych – było zbrojnym wystąpieniem przeciwko Rosji. Za jego początek przyjmuje się datę 22 stycznia 1863 roku. Objęło ono swym zasięgiem Królestwo Polskie, Litwę, Białoruś oraz część Ukrainy.

Przyczyną Powstania Styczniowego był nasilający się rosyjski ucisk narodu polskiego. Już od 1856 r. na terenach Polski wcielonych do Rosji ("Ziemiach Zabranych"), a także w Królestwie Polskim zaczęły powstawać organizacje spiskowe, w których trwały przygotowania do walki zbronej.

W latach 1861-1862 Polacy coraz bardziej domagali się reform agrarnych, społecznych oraz niepodległości.



"Branka", Aleksander Sochaczewski (1843–1923)

11 czerwca 1860 r. pogrzeb wdowy po gen. Józefie Sowińskim (obrońcy Woli z 1831 roku) wywołał demonstrację patriotyczną z udziałem kilkunastu tysięcy osób. W rocznicę wybuchu Powstania Listopadowego, 29 listopada 1860 roku, zorganizowano następną wielką manifestację. 25 lutego 1861 tłumy demonstrowały z okazji trzydziestej rocznicy bitwy pod Olszynką Grochowską. Większość manifestacji była krwawo tłumiona przez władze rosyjskie. W tych latach też uformowały się dwa przeciwstawne obozy polityczne w Królestwie: "czerwonych" – dążących do wybuchu powstania – oraz "białych" – przeciwników jakichkolwiek zrywów zbrojnych.

Władze rosyjskie zdawały sobie sprawę z tego, że naród polski przygotowuje się do walki. Naczelnik rządu Królestwa Polskiego - Aleksander Wielopolski, by pokrzyżować plany organizacjom spiskowym, zarządził przeprowadzenie "branki", czyli poboru Polaków do wojska rosyjskiego. Termin "branki" wyznaczył na połowę stycznia 1963 r. Przyśpieszyło to decyzję o wybuchu

powstania. "Branka" została zbojkotowana, a Centralny Komitet Narodowy "czerwonych" przeobraził się w Tymczasowy Rząd Narodowy i 22 stycznia 1863 proklamował powstanie. W marcu 1863 do powstania przystąpili "biali".

Powstanie ze względu na znaczną dysproporcję sił walczących przybrało formę wojny partyzanckiej. Stoczono ponad tysiąc dwieście potyczek i mniejszych bitew, m.in. pod Miechowem, Małogoszcza, Chrobrzem, Grochowiskami, Żyrzynem, Opatowem, ale unikano walnej bitwy. Dyktatorami powstania byli kolejno: L. Mierosławski, M. Langiewicz i R. Traugutt. W wojskach powstańczych służyło ok. 200 tys. Polaków. Walki powstańcze trwały do wiosny 1864 roku. 5 sierpnia 1864 Rosjanie dokonali egzekucji dowódcy powstania Romualda Traugutta i czterech członków Rządu Narodowego.

Powstanie Styczniowe okazało się wielką klęską dla narodu polskiego. Odzyskanie niepodległości stało się czymś niemożliwym i przestano myśleć o kolejnych zrywach narodowowyzwoleńczych.

Szacuje się, że w powstaniu styczniowym zginęły dziesiątki tysięcy osób. Około 400 osób stracono z wyroków sądów, 700 wcielono do armii carskiej, kilkanaście tysięcy zesłano na Syberię, a dziesiątki tysięcy drobnej szlachty z pogranicza polskoukraińskiego przesiedlono. Klęska Powstania Styczniowego spowodowała także ogromne straty materialne. Następstwem insurekcji była też likwidacja odrębności i autonomii Królestwa Polskiego, zmiana nazwy kraju na "Przywiślański Kraj" i (szczególnie w latach 1864-1876) bezwzględna rusyfikacja. Zakazano działalności oświatowej i kulturalnej w języku polskim, do szkół i urzędów wprowadzono język rosyjski jako język oficjalny. Ostre represje dotknęły również Kościół katolicki i unicki. Dokonano kasacji wszystkich klasztorów w Królestwie, a miastom, które podczas Powstania Styczniowego czynnie pomagały powstańcom, odebrano prawa miejskie.

Nastepne 50 lat, które dzieliły Polaków od niepodległości, to czas, kiedy społeczeństwo coraz częściej zwracało się ku ideałom pozytywizmu – pracy u podstaw i pracy organicznej. Ważną cechą polskiego ruchu narodowego w tym okresie stało się dążenie do harmonijnej współpracy przedstawicieli wszystkich warstw społecznych, wspieranie materialne różnych inicjatyw narodowych i przygotowywanie się do odzyskania wolności.

"...Matce swej Ojczyźnie, dług życia spłacić ofiarną i uczciwą pracą dla jej dobra i wielkości, rodakom zawsze miłość bratnią świadczyć, narodom, z którymi los, wojna i wspólne niedole nas złączyły, przyjaźni wiernie dochować, Bogu nie samą modlitwą ale cnotą wdzięczność okazać..."

Słowa te zawarte są w "Dokumencie Ocalenia" wręczonym 14-letniej Helenie Ostojskiej Nowickiej w Teheranie w 1942 roku po jej powrocie z Syberii. Dla tych, którzy znają panią Helenę jest oczywiste, że słowa te stały się mottem jej życia, jest ona osoba, która może służyć jako przykład wzorowej obywatelki obu krajów: Polski i Stanów Zjednoczonych.

2-go Listopada 2012 r. odbyło się spotkanie z paniami, które jako dzieci były wywiezione na Sybir i panem, który przeżył obóz koncentracyjny w Oświęcimiu. Inicjatorką zorganizowania spotkania z "żywa historią" była Teresa Makowska, prezeska Grupy #114 Związku Polek w Ameryce. Pani Makowska organizowała już wiele akcji i spotkań, które były wspaniałymi sukcesami. "Wieczór Wspomnień" odbył się pod patronatem Komisji 27 Związku Polek, a Grupa #114 była gospodarzem. Program prowadzony był w większości w języku polskim a Mary Piergies, redaktorka Głosu Polek, tłumaczyła na bieżąco na język angielski.

Antoinette Trela, Sekretarka-Skarbniczka Związku Polek w Ameryce powitała wszystkich obecnych, po czym głos zabrała prezeska Komisji 27 ZPwA, Bogumiła Padowski. Program prowadziła Teresa Makowska, która opracowała i przedstawiła zwięzłą historię Polski ostatnich 200-tu lat, dzięki temu na tle dramatu Narodu Polskiego łatwiej można było zrozumieć dramatyczne losy poszczególnych bohaterów wieczoru. Po tym wykładzie z historii Maria Pawlik z emocjonalnym wyczuciem przeczytała wiersz p.t. "Syberia", wiersz p.t. "Szli" Feliksa Konarskiego o drodze zesłańców do Armii Polskiej oraz "Dokument Ocalenia" wydany w Teheranie na polecenie Prezydenta Rządu Polskiego Władysława Raczkiewicza i Generała Sikorskiego, wręczony tym, którzy zdołali wyrwać się z "nieludzkiej ziemi".

Pani Makowska zręcznie wkomponowała informacje historyczne w całość programu przypominając realia tamtych czasów. Zanim poprosiła bohaterów wieczoru na scenę, powiedziała: "To

z Teheranu zaczeły się wędrówki matek z dziećmi lub samych sierot (bo i tak było) do wielu krajów świata, m.in. do Indii, Nowej Zelandii, Meksyku, na kontynent afrykański itd., by ostatecznie – po latach – znaleźć swoją nową Ojczyznę. Bowiem tylko nielicznym udało się powrócić do swojej Starej Ojczyzny – Polski. Z wielką uwagą będziemy się więc wsłuchiwać w świadectwa pań: Heleny Nowickiej i Krystyny Nowobilskiej, a pana Janusza Kopcia, poetę, literata i malarza prosimy o przeprowadzenie z nimi rozmów. Póżniej poprosimy pana Konstantego Trelę o opowiedzenie swojej historii, historii ocierania sie o śmierć po stronie okupanta niemieckiego".

Pani Helena Nowicka i pani Krystyna Nowobilska były bardzo wzruszone, dawne przeżycia obudziły się na nowo. Obie stwierdziły, że ogromna wiara w Boga pozwoliła im przetrwać te najcięższe w ich życiu czasy. Przeżycia pana Treli, przeczytane przez jego zięcia John'a Schoen oraz przekazane osobiście są dowodem, że wiara w Boga, ciężka, uczciwa praca i przy tym trochę przysłowiowego szczęścia pomogły mu w życiu.

Ten wzruszający wieczór był świetną lekcją żywej historii. Po zakończeniu programu Prezeska Związku Polek pani Delphine Huneycutt podziękowała Teresie Makowskiej za ogromne zaangażowanie i pięknie przygotowany program. Uznanie wyraziła Honorowa Prezeska ZPwA Virginia Sikora. Słowa podziękowania wyraziła również Wiceprezeska Sharon Zago. Po zrobieniu pamiątkowych zdjęć był czas na indywidualne rozmowy z bohaterami wieczoru przy lampce wina i wyśmienitym poczęstunku sponsorowanym przez państwa Haline i Stanisława Urbaniak, właścicieli sklepów Montrose oraz Cicero Deli. Każdy miał okazję podziwiać wspaniałe, nastrojowe dekoracje przygotowane przez Halinę Wiśniewską oraz wystawę przygotowaną przez Anię Holmberg.

Nastrój wieczoru podkreśliły utwory Chopina wybrane przez Ryszarda Makowskiego, który, podobnie jak żona, włożył wiele czasu i serca w przygotowanie programu. Na tym spotkaniu opowiedziały swoje historie ocalenia tylko trzy osoby, (pani Barbara Ciepiela, która miała również podzielić się swoimi wspomnieniami nie mogła uczestniczyć) ale była to reprezentacja setek tysięcy ludzi, którzy znaleźli się na "nieludzkiej ziemi". Naszym obowiązkiem jest pamiętać i mówić, by historia taka nigdy się nie powtórzyła.
