SAINT ISAAC JOGUES AND COMPANIONS

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Isaac Jogues was born in 1607 in Orleans, France. Having heard many stories of the Jesuit missionaries and their martyrdom, he entered the Order of Jesus at the age of 17. At that time missionaries were focusing on the New World. Upon his ordination, Father Jogues was sent to the Jesuit mission at Lake Huron in Canada. The New World was nothing but wilderness. By the end of Father Jogues' very difficult 900-mile journey he was stricken by fever. The mission itself lacked proper sanitation, was infested, and food was scarce. An epidemic broke out among the Jesuits as well as the natives of the village. With epidemics becoming a regular occurrence, the Huron Indians blamed the "Black Coats," as they called the Jesuits, threatening to kill them all. They were eventually calmed so that by the following year relations between the Huron and the Jesuits improved.

For six years Father Jogues lived in the village and learned the ways and language of the Huron. Gradually they began to accept him. They realized that he and his companions were not there to profit in any way but to share the Word of God. Many of the Indians accepted Christianity. However this good will did not last as some Indians spread reports of how missionaries only brought misfortune wherever they went. The Mohawk tribe of the Iroquois, who were enemies of the Huron, was the most dangerous threat. After a particularly bad winter Father Jogues, along with his companions and some Huron, made the dangerous trip to Quebec City for supplies. On their journey they were attacked by the Mohawk who beat Father Jogues with clubs and sticks until he was unconscious. After this they tore out his fingernails and chewed the two forefingers on his hands. René Goupil, one of the lay missionaries who had ac-

"Ondessonk" (the Indominable One). Slowly he was afforded some freedom. He baptized 70 dying Mohawks, including one of the men who had bitten off his fingers.

In the fall of 1643 Father Jogues was able to escape when taken on a trading expedition with the Mohawk. He was hidden by the Dutch until a ship took him downriver to Manhattan Island. From there he sailed to France. Now able to freely celebrate Mass, he was given a special dispensation by the Pope to handle the Blessed Sacrament without the use of his missing fingers. In France he was welcomed as a living martyr. Still he longed to return to his ministry with the Indians, which he did after four months' time.

With talk of a peace treaty, Father Jogues was asked to act as ambassador for the French because of his familiarity with the Indians, along with a layman named Jean de Lalande. Father Jogues returned to the same Mohawk village where he had been tortured and kept as a slave. The people of the village accepted that he was there to promote peace between the tribes. Father Jogues made several visits there and planned to winter in the village, but this never happened. Because of

priest by comforting the other captives and caring for the sick. He mastered the Mohawk language and was given the name

Father Jogues returned to the same Mohawk village where he had been tortured and kept as a slave. The people of the village accepted that he was there to promote peace between the tribes. Father Jogues made several visits there and planned to winter in the village, but this never happened. Because of disease that had spread within the tribe and the failure of crops due to insect infestation, the Mohawk placed blame on Mass vestments and personal effects that had been left by the Jesuits on a previous visit. They accused the Black Coats of putting a curse on them. Once again Father Jogues was taken captive. The majority of the Mohawk tribe voted to set him free, but one faction disagreed and took matters into their own hands. They invited Father Jogues to feast in one of their tents. When he arrived they killed him by a tomahawk to the head. The next day they killed Jean de Lalande.

In the following years the Iroquois broke their treaty with the French and destroyed all of the Huron villages and Jesuit mission posts. Five other Jesuit priests were martyred. They, along with Father Jogues, Jean de Lalande and René Goupil, would become known as the eight North American Martyrs who were canonized by Pope Pius XI in1930.

Eventually peace between the Huron and Mohawk was established; Jesuit missionaries once again returned. Two final interesting facts: The Mohawk Indian who had tomahawked Father Jogues converted to Christianity and took the name "Isaac Jogues" as his baptismal name. Secondly, ten years after Father Jogues' death, a Mohawk woman named Kateri Tekakwitha was born in the same village and accepted Christianity. She would become the first Native American to be canonized, a result of the ministry that began with Father Jogues.

Saint Isaac Jogues, pray for us, that we may act with Christ-like charity to all.

This two-week program encompassed daily 3-3.5 hour Polish language lessons, with the students having been tested on the day of arrival and class placement determined by level of knowledge, so that the students in each group were learning at the same pace.

In addition, there were cultural outings and activities including:

- · A tour of the Jagiellonian University Museum
- · Sightseeing of Old Town and Wawel Castle in Krakow
- A trip and hiking in Zakopane
- A workshop at the Stanislaw Lem Garden of Experiences
- · A cruise along the Vistula River to Tyniec
- · A tour of Ogrodzieniec Castle
- · A visit to Bochnia Salt Mine
- · A visit to Krakus Mound
- · Sports activities and competitions on-campus
- · Free time for shopping

Of course, the students were given time each afternoon for a break to rest and socialize together after lunch. In addition to the 35 students sponsored by PACCF, there were 25 students of Polish heritage from a number of other countries,

Fall Harvest Recipes

PARMESAN ASPARAGUS

- 1 pound fresh asparagus, tough ends trimmed
- 2 tablespoons water
- 2 tablespoons melted butter
- 1 lemon wedge
- 1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese ground white pepper to taste

Place asparagus and water in 8x8 inch microwave-safe dish and cover.

Heat in microwave on high until tender, 6 to 7 minutes. Line a baking sheet with foil.

Preheat the oven's broiler and set the oven rack about 6 inches from the heat source.

Remove asparagus from dish and place in a single layer on the prepared baking sheet. Squeeze lemon wedge into melted butter and drizzle over asparagus.

Sprinkle Parmesan cheese and ground white pepper over asparagus. Place under broiler until lightly browned, about 2 minutes.

ROASTED BUTTERNUT SQUASH PASTA

1 butternut squash, peeled and cubed ½ white onion, chopped roughly olive oil, to taste

salt, pepper, and nutmeg, to taste

- 1 cup vegetable broth
- 1 cup almond milk
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 teaspoon red pepper flakes, optional
- 1 teaspoon dried sage
- 1 head broccoli, steamed

8 oz. whole wheat pasta, cooked grated parmesan cheese, to serve

Preheat oven to 400 degrees.

Add butternut squash and onion to a parchment paper-lined baking sheet, and

season with olive oil, salt, pepper, and nutmeg.

Roast for 25-30 minutes, or until tender. Add roasted squash and onion to a food processor or blender. Add vegetable broth, almond milk, and blend until smooth.

In a large sauce pot over medium heat, add olive oil, garlic, red pepper flakes, and sage. Cook for about 1 minute, or until fragrant. Add squash puree and bring to a simmer, stirring occasionally.

Add cooked pasta and steamed broccoli and stir to combine.

Top with Parmesan, and serve.

CHEESESTEAK STEW IN A BREAD BOWL

1½ pound beef sirloin, sliced salt and pepper to taste

1/4 teaspoon onion powder

4 tablespoons all-purpose flour

olive oil, drizzle

2 large onions, sliced

10 ounces mushrooms, sliced

1/2 teaspoon dried thyme

3 cloves garlic, crushed

4 cups beef stock

1/₃ cup heavy cream

4 sourdough bread bowls

4 slices provolone cheese

Add sliced beef to a large bowl, season with salt, pepper, onion powder and toss to coat. Sprinkle with 2 tablespoons flour, toss to coat.

Place a pot over medium-high heat, drizzle olive oil. Once hot, add half the sirloin and cook till brown, remove onto a plate to hold, then repeat with the remaining sirloin. Set aside.

Add more oil to the pot, add sliced onions, add pinch of salt and pepper, and caramelize the onions, stirring frequently to avoid burning.

Once the onions are softened, add mushrooms and continue sautéing until cooked.

Stir in dried thyme and garlic. Sprinkle remaining 2 tablespoons of flour onto mixture, stir to combine, then add beef stock. Reduce heat to medium-low, and simmer for 10 minutes.

Mix in heavy cream, then add beef, along with juices, stir to combine. Ladle stew into hollowed out sourdough bowls, top with slice of provolone, then broil until the cheese is brown and melted.

PUMPKIN DUMP CAKE

1 can (29 oz.) pure pumpkin (not pumpkin pie filling)

1 can (12 oz.) evaporated milk

- 3 whole eggs
- 1 cup white sugar
- 3 teaspoons cinnamon

- 1 box Super Moist yellow cake mix
- 1 cup chopped pecans (optional)
- 3/4 cup butter, melted

Preheat oven to 350 degrees and grease a 9x13 baking dish.

In a large bowl, mix pumpkin, milk, eggs, sugar, and cinnamon until well blended. Spread pumpkin mixture in prepared baking dish. Mixture will be very wet.

Sprinkle cake mix evenly on top of the batter. If adding pecans, sprinkle them over the cake mix. Pour melted butter over the top of the cake mix. Bake 50 minutes.

Cool completely. Top with whipped cream or ice cream.

FOOLPROOF CARAMEL CORN

7 quarts plain popped popcorn

2 cups dry roasted peanuts (optional)

2 cups brown sugar

½ cup light corn syrup

- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup margarine
- ½ teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Place the popped popcorn into two shallow greased baking pans. Add the peanuts to the popped corn. Set aside.

Preheat the oven to 250 degrees.

Combine the brown sugar, corn syrup, margarine and salt in a saucepan. Bring to a boil over medium heat, stirring enough to blend. Once the mixture begins to boil, boil for 5 minutes while stirring constantly.

Remove from the heat, and stir in the baking soda and vanilla. The mixture will be light and foamy. Immediately pour over the popcorn in the pans, and stir to coat. Don't worry too much at this point about getting all of the corn coated.

Bake for 1 hour, removing the pans, and giving them each a good stir every 15 minutes. Line the counter top with waxed paper. Dump the corn out onto the waxed paper and separate the pieces. Allow to cool completely, then store in airtight containers or resealable bags.

PUMPKIN SPICE COFFEE

- 1 cup brewed coffee
- 1 cup almond milk
- 2 tablespoons pumpkin puree
- 2 tablespoons maple syrup, or sweetener of choice
- 1/4 teaspoon vanilla extract
- ½ teaspoon pumpkin pie spice, or ¼ teaspoon cinnamon plus ¼ teaspoon nutmeg whipped cream, optional

Combine all ingredients in a medium sauce pot and heat through, making sure not to boil, stirring occasionally.

Serve hot, or over ice! Top with whipped cream and a cinnamon stick (optional).
