

# A PARABLE OF A CHILD

There is a difference between education and experience. Education is what you get from reading the small print. Experience is what you get from not reading it.

But isn't it true that great learning comes from both education and experience? Let me tell you a parable:

A young school teacher had a dream that an angel appeared to him and said, "You will be given a child who will grow up to become a world leader. How will you prepare her? How will you challenge her intelligence? How will you help her grow in confidence? How will you help her develop both her assertiveness as well as her sensitivity? How will you teach her to be open-minded and, at the same time, strong in character? In short, what kind of education will you provide that she can become one of the world's truly GREAT leaders?"

The young teacher awoke in a cold sweat. It had never occurred to him before – any ONE of his present or future students could be the person described in his dream. Was he preparing them to rise to ANY POSITION to which they may aspire? He thought, How might my teaching change if I KNEW that one of my students were this person?' He gradually began to formulate a plan in his mind.

This student would need experience as well as instruction. She would need to know how to solve problems of all kinds. She would need to become knowledgeable, but more than that. She would also need to stand firmly on strong values and grow in character. She would need self-assurance as well as the ability to listen well and work with others. She would need to understand and appreciate the past, yet convey a realistic hope about the future. She would need to know the value of lifelong learning in order to keep a curious and active mind. She would need to grow in understanding of others and become a student of the spirit. She would need to set high standards for herself and learn self-discipline, yet she would also need love and encouragement, that she might know compassion.

His teaching changed. Every young person who walked through his classroom became, for him, a future world leader. He saw each one, not as they were, but as they could be. He expected the best from his students, yet tempered it with gentleness. He taught each one as if the future of the world depended on his instruction. After many years, a woman he knew rose to a position of world prominence. He realized that she must surely have been the girl described in his dream. Only she was not one of his students—she was his daughter. For of all the various teachers in her life, her father was the best.

#### Dear Friends,

I've heard it said that, "Children are living messages we send to a time and place we will never see." But this isn't simply a parable about an unnamed school teacher. It is a parable about you and me – whether or not we are parents or even teachers. And the story, OUR story, actually begins like this: "You will be given a child who will grow up to become...." You finish the sentence. If not a world leader, then a superb father? An excellent teacher? A gifted healer? A caring mother? An innovative problem solver? An inspiring artist? A generous philanthropist? Where and how you will encounter this child is a mystery. But believe that one child's future may depend upon influence only you can provide, and something remarkable will happen. For no young person will ever be ordinary to you again. And you will never be the same.

### FIFTH JOYFUL MYSTERY: THE FINDING OF JESUS IN THE TEMPLE

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Last month I wrote about the Presentation in the Temple when Jesus was 40 days old. The fifth and last of the Joyful Mysteries of the Rosary is the Finding of Jesus in the Temple. The spiritual fruit most commonly associated with this mystery is Piety.

It was the custom every year for families to travel to Jerusalem for the Feast of the Passover and to stay for a minimum of two days. Pilgrims normally traveled in caravans since it was safer than traveling alone. During a boy's twelfth year he was being prepared for his induction as a full member of the religious community which took place when he was thirteen. So when Jesus was twelve, Joseph and Mary traveled with him to the Temple in Jerusalem to celebrate the Feast. The trip from Nazareth in Galilee was approximately 65 miles and would entail a week or so of travel each way.

When the Feast was over Mary and Joseph left in their caravan to return to Nazareth. Normally women were placed in the center of the caravan while men and boys were in the back to protect the women. The size of a caravan could be quite large. Mary and Joseph assumed Jesus was with them in the caravan but


visiting friends or relatives who were also traveling with them. It was not until the end of the first day of their return trip that they realized Jesus was not among their relatives. They searched throughout the caravan but could not find him. You can imagine the panic that any parent feels at not being able to find a child. It seems that Jesus had taken it upon himself to stay behind in Jerusalem without informing his parents.

Mary and Joseph quickly did a turnaround and returned to Jerusalem which probably required most of another full day of travel. After three days they finally entered the Temple, perhaps to plead for God's help in finding their son. There they recognized a voice. They were surprised to find Jesus sitting among the learned teachers, listening and asking questions. Those who heard him were amazed at his wisdom and understanding. Although Mary may have understood that Jesus had good reason for his actions, because of all her worry she said to him, "Son, why have you treated us like this? Your father and I have been anxiously searching for you." To this Jesus replied, "Why were you searching for me? Did you not know that I must be about my Father's business?"

It almost seems that Jesus is talking back to his mother but in reality he is just a naive 12-year old who is surprised that his parents had to search for him when they should have realized that he was in the Temple. Most likely to Jesus' way of thinking, they knew of his divinity and that at some point he would have to begin preparing to do his heavenly Father's will. It is a turning point in the life of Jesus as he now is faced with a need to obey his heavenly Father and at the same time be obedient to his parents on earth. The incident ends well with the Holy Family returning to Nazareth where Jesus "grew and became strong; filled with wisdom, and the grace of God was upon him."

There are some interesting facts about the Finding of Jesus in the Temple. For one, it is the only biblically recorded incident in Our Lord's younger years after his birth and the flight to Egypt when he was still an infant. So basically twelve years have passed. The incident is also the last time that Joseph is ever mentioned in the life of Jesus. It is also the first record of any words spoken by Jesus. Finally, there is no other record to illustrate Christ's life for eighteen more years when Christ began his public life at the age of thirty.

The passage in the gospel of the Finding of Jesus in the Temple is short, but St. Luke saw the importance of recording this childhood incident that gives us Christ's first acknowledgment of his awareness of his purpose and destiny. Although there is no other record for eighteen more years, we know that Jesus continued to grow physically and spiritually as he prepared for the day when he would begin his work as the Messiah.

August is Founders Month at First Catholic Slovak Ladies Association. After our early beginnings in January 1892, Anna Hurban, our Foundress, called for a convention in Cleveland, Ohio in August of that same year. She was a visionary leader, in part because she called delegates from Pennsylvania, New York, Minnesota and Indiana, as well as from Ohio. She began to

develop a national imprint for our association even in those early years.

In 1905 we established our Junior Order, as a vehicle to allow children to be insured and taken care of, as well. We were one of the first fraternal benefit societies, if not the first to do so, in an era of severe infant and early childhood death.

The recipients of this year's traditional scholarship program are showcased in this August issue. A total of 426 scholarships have been awarded to 426 deserving students. This year we have also included awards in the Florence Hovanec Memorial Scholarship category and awards from John and Geraldine Gaydos. We are grateful for the generous support from the Gaydos and

By that time, even though just allowed to vote for the first time for the 1920 election, our Slovak-American women who were American citizens had established our Association in 1892, incorporated under Ohio law, held several national conventions, founded the Junior Order in 1905 and survived the 1918 Spanish influenza epidemic and World War I. We witnessed the breakup of the Austro-Hungarian Empire and establishment of the democratic Czecho-Slovak Republic.

We celebrate the 100th anniversary of ratification of the 19th amendment! Let us not forget to exercise that right.

#### SLOW-COOKER CREAMED CORN

5 cups fresh whole kernel corn

- 4 packages (3 oz. each) cream cheese, cut into cubes
- 1 cup milk
- 1/2 cup butter or margarine, melted
- 2 teaspoons sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper

Spread corn over bottom of 3- to 4-quart slow cooker. Top with cream cheese cubes. In small bowl, stir together remaining ingredients; pour over corn and cream cheese.

Cover; cook on High heat setting 2 to 3 hours. Stir well before serving. Corn will hold on Low heat setting up to 2 hours; stir occasionally.

#### **TACO SALAD**

- 1 lb. lean (at least 80%) ground beef
- 1 package taco seasoning mix
- 1 head iceberg lettuce, broken into small pieces
- 2 medium tomatoes, chopped
- ½ cup sliced ripe olives
- 4 medium green onions, sliced (1/4 cup)
- 2 cups shredded Cheddar cheese (8 oz.)
- ½ cup Catalina salad dressing
- 1 bag nacho-flavored tortilla chips, coarsley crushed

In 10-inch skillet, cook beef and taco seasoning mix as directed on seasoning mix package.

In large bowl, gently mix lettuce, tomatoes, olives, onions and cheese. Add beef mixture; stir gently to mix. Just before serving, add dressing and chips – toss.

#### **STEAKHOUSE SALAD**

- 12 small red potatoes, quartered
- 2 tablespoons olive or vegetable oil
- 2 teaspoons kosher (coarse) salt
- ½ teaspoon pepper
- 1 lb. beef flank steak
- 1 bag (6 oz.) washed fresh baby spinach leaves
- 1 medium tomato, cut into bite-size pieces 1/4 cup tangy tomato bacon dressing

Heat oven to 375 degrees. In large bowl, toss potatoes, 1 tablespoon of the oil, 1 teaspoon of the salt and ¼ teaspoon of the pepper. Spread on cookie sheet with sides. Roast 20 to 25 minutes, stirring occasionally, until tender.

Meanwhile, sprinkle beef steak with remaining 1 teaspoon salt and ¼ teaspoon pepper. In 12-inch nonstick skillet, heat remaining 1 tablespoon oil over medium heat. Add beef; cover and cook 8 to 10 minutes, turning once, until desired doneness.

Remove beef from skillet to cutting board; cover with foil and let rest 5 minutes.

Cut beef into thin bite-size pieces. In large bowl, toss beef, potatoes, spinach, tomato and dressing.

#### BACON-CHEDDAR-RANCH PINWHEELS

- 2 packages (8 oz. each) cream cheese, softened
- $1\frac{1}{2}$  cups shredded Cheddar cheese (6 oz.)
- 6 slices chopped cooked bacon
- 1 tablespoon ranch dressing & seasoning mix
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh chives
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
- ½ teaspoon onion powder
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 5 flour tortillas for burritos (8 inch)

In large bowl, beat all ingredients except tortillas with electric mixer on medium speed until well mixed. Divide mixture evenly among tortillas, spreading evenly. Tightly roll up tortillas. Cut into ½-inch slices, and serve.

#### SLOW-COOKER BACON CHEESEBURGER DIP

8 slices bacon

½ lb. lean (at least 85%) ground beef

- 1 package (8 oz.) cream cheese, cubed
- 1 package (8 oz.) shredded

American-Cheddar cheese blend (2 cups)

- 1 can (10 oz.) diced tomatoes with green chiles, undrained
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley
- 2 medium red bell peppers, cut into bite-size strips
- 1 package (5.25 oz.) mini bagel chips

In 12-inch skillet, cook bacon over medium-high heat, turning occasionally, until crisp; drain on paper towels. Crumble bacon; reserve 2 tablespoons bacon for garnish.

In same skillet, cook beef over mediumhigh heat 5 to 7 minutes, stirring occasionally, until thoroughly cooked; drain. Reduce heat to low. Stir in cream cheese, shredded cheese, tomatoes and crumbled bacon until well mixed and cheese starts to melt.

Pour mixture into 1- to 11/2-quart slow

cooker. Cover; cook on Low heat setting 2 to 3 hours or until bubbly.

Stir parsley into dip. Sprinkle with reserved bacon for garnish. Keep on Low heat setting to serve. Serve with bell pepper strips and bagel chips.

#### LEMONADE BISCOTTI

½ cup butter or margarine, melted

- 1/4 cup frozen (thawed) lemonade concentrate
- 2 teaspoons grated lemon peel
- 1 teaspoon lemon extract
- 2 eggs
- 1 pouch (1 lb. 1.5 oz.) sugar cookie mix
- 1½ cups all-purpose flour
- ½ cup chopped dried cherries

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Line large cookie sheet with foil. In large bowl, stir butter, lemonade concentrate, lemon peel, lemon extract and eggs until well mixed. Add remaining ingredients; stir until soft dough forms.

Divide dough in half. On cookie sheet, shape each  $\frac{1}{2}$  of dough into a 12 x 2-inch log.

Bake 25 to 30 minutes or until edges are golden brown. Cool 15 minutes.

Carefully lift foil to move cookie logs to cutting board. With serrated knife, carefully cut each log crosswise on a slight diagonal into ¾-inch slices. Place slices cut side down on cookie sheet.

Bake 15 to 20 minutes, gently turning cookies over once during baking. Cool 2 minutes; remove from cookie sheet to cooling rack. Cool completely. Store loosely covered at room temperature.

#### RASPBERRY-LEMON FRUIT DIP

½ cup raspberry reduced-fat cream cheese spread, from 8-ounce container, softened ½ cup marshmallow creme

1 container (6 ounces) lemon yogurt Assorted fresh fruit pieces or berries

Mix cream cheese and marshmallow creme in medium bowl with wire whisk until smooth. Stir in yogurt. Serve dip with fruit.

#### OLD-FASHIONED LEMONADE

6 cups cold water

2 cups lemon juice (8 to 10 lemons)

1 cup sugar


Ice cube

Lemon slice, if desired

Maraschino cherry with stem, if desired

Mix water, lemon juice and sugar in large pitcher until sugar is dissolved. Refrigerate about 3 hours or until chilled if desired.
