

THE HOLY INNOCENTS

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Much focus is given to the Advent Season preparing for Christmas and the birth of the Lord. But the Church also celebrates the Octave of Christmas, beginning with Christmas Day itself and ending on January 1st. The Feast of the Holy Innocents is celebrated on December 28, the fourth day of the Octave of Christmas when the Church celebrates the memory of the small and innocent children of the neighborhood of Bethlehem who were put to death by Herod.

King Herod was reigning in Judea at the time of the birth of Our Savior. He was the most cruel and cold-blooded ruler of his time. He was also very insecure and feared that another would take his throne. The Magi, who were known to be astrologers, arrived in Jerusalem inquiring about a newborn child who was prophesied to be "King of the Jews." They had seen his star in the eastern sky and came to pay him homage. When Herod learned that the three Wise Men had come to Jerusalem in search of the newborn King of the Jews, he immediately became troubled. He was aware of the prophecy

which made him nervous. He felt his throne was in danger. He told the Wise Men once they found the child, to bring him word so that he took might go and adore Him. Of course we know that was not his true intention.

The star that had guided the Magi then reappeared over Bethlehem where they followed and found the infant and adored him. They recognized the Christ Child's divinity and offered Him their royal gifts. God then warned them in a dream afterwards not to go back to Herod, so they returned to their lands by a different route. Saint Joseph too was warned by an angel to take the Child Jesus and Mary and flee into Egypt, "for it will come to pass that Herod will seek the child to destroy him."

Herod was furious when he learned the Magi had tricked him. He called his chief priests and scribes who were experts in Jewish law and asked where this so-called Messiah was to be born. Based on prophecies, they named Bethlehem of Judea, which was the city of David. In a rage Herod gave orders that every boy two years of age and under in Bethlehem and the surrounding area should be killed. According to the gospel of Matthew, the massacre fulfilled the words of the prophet Jeremiah that had prophesied this event: "A cry was heard in Ramah, sobbing and loud lamentation: Rachel bewailing her children; no comfort for her since they are no more."

During the Octave of Christmas the Church celebrates the memory of these small children. Some may wonder why God permitted this massacre. On a level of deep faith, we must strive to understand the witness that these innocent children gave. They are regarded as martyrs because they not only died for Christ but in His place. The Church honors not only these Holy Innocents but all who die in a state of innocence, especially very young children and babies. Included in this are the millions of unborn children who are sadly killed through abortion.

The Feast of the Holy Innocents is celebrated as a way of saying that God has transformed this tragedy into something glorious. The Church looks to the glory of these innocent children who attained the grace of everlasting life. As Saint Augustine stated, "The precious death of any martyr deserves high praise because of his heroic confession; the death of these children is precious in the sight of God because of the beatitude they gained so quickly. These then...are justly hailed as 'infant martyr flowers'; they were the Church's first blossoms...." Rightfully the Holy Innocents are the patron saints of babies.

A point of interest: Many of you are familiar with the "Coventry Carol" that is sung during Christmas. It dates from the 16^{th} century. You probably have not paid attention to the lyrics, but the hauntingly beautiful carol, which is traditionally sung *a capella*, refers to the massacre of the Holy Innocents.

Enjoy the time spent with your families during Advent and throughout the Christmas Season. As you sit down for your traditional Vilija meal, enjoy your bobalky, mushroom soup and pirohy. Don't forget the oplatky and honey! Most importantly kiss your children and babies often and bless each of them with the Sign of the Cross.

One of these time-honored traditions is Christmas Eve supper "Vilija" or "Wigilia" in Polish.

In our house, we dress in our best attire, put out the best china and silver, and the best white tablecloth and linens. Everyone waits in anticipation as we light the first candles and pray Christmas prayers for living and deceased members of our family. The eldest child goes from person to person, breaking oplatky with everyone present and places the sign of the cross on the forehead of each person with the oplatky, dipping honey, to welcome the baby Jesus into our hearts and homes.

For generations, our meal has always consisted of

oplatky, wine, clear mushroom soup, bobalky, sauerkraut, apples, walnuts, poppyseed and nut rolls and sweet raisin bread.

As we celebrate and share together every year, we strengthen our bond together for both good and bad times. Let us be grateful for how fortunate we are to be part of a family where we love each other, no matter what, and we belong to each other.

I am grateful for the resounding support and vote that I received in my re-election as National President (CEO) of this noble association. As time goes on in my service to First Catholic Slovak Ladies Association, I appreciate even more the hard work, diligence and wisdom that our leadership and employees and volunteers bring in dedication and commitment to our noble cause. 


































More Convention Photos in the next Fraternally Yours



Holiday Sweets for Treats

BEST CHOCOLATE CHIP COOKIES

1 cup butter, softened

1 cup white sugar

1 cup packed brown sugar

2 eggs

2 teaspoons vanilla extract

1 teaspoon baking soda

2 teaspoons hot water

1/2 teaspoon salt

3 cups all-purpose flour

2 cups semisweet chocolate chips

1 cup chopped walnuts

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Cream together the butter, white sugar, and brown sugar until smooth. Beat in the eggs one at a time, then stir in the vanilla. Dissolve baking soda in hot water. Add to batter along with salt. Stir in flour, chocolate chips, and nuts. Drop by large spoonfuls onto ungreased pans.

Bake for about 10 minutes in the preheated oven, or until edges are nicely browned.

SPICY OATMEAL RAISIN COOKIES

½ cup butter, softened ½ cup butter flavored shortening 1 cup packed light brown sugar ½ cup white sugar 2 eggs

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

1½ cups all-purpose flour

1 teaspoon baking soda

1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1/2 teaspoon ground cloves

1/2 teaspoon salt

3 cups rolled oats

1 cup raisins

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

In a large bowl, cream together the butter, butter flavored shortening, brown sugar, white sugar, eggs, and vanilla until smooth. Combine the flour, baking soda, cinnamon, cloves, and salt; stir into the sugar mixture. Stir in the oats and raisins. Drop by rounded teaspoonfuls onto ungreased cookie sheets.

Bake 10 to 12 minutes until light and golden. Do not overbake. Let them cool for 2 minutes before removing from cookie sheets to cool completely. Store in airtight container.

PAGACH

For the Dough:

11/4 cup water (divided)

6 teaspoons sugar (divided)

1 teaspoon salt

2½ tablespoons canola oil (or butter)

1 package active dry yeast

3 cups all-purpose flour

For the Potato Filling:

2 cups potatoes (diced, cooked,

and mashed)

Salt. to taste

½ cup cheddar cheese, grated

In a medium saucepan, bring 1 cup water, $4\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoons sugar, salt, and oil to a boil. Remove the pan from the heat and let it cool to lukewarm. Dissolve the yeast and $1\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoons sugar in $\frac{1}{4}$ cup lukewarm water and set it aside.

Place the flour in the bowl of a stand mixer or regular bowl and add the sugar-water mixture and the yeast-water mixture. Mix until well incorporated and then knead the dough until smooth, about 7 minutes by machine or at least 10 minutes by hand.

Transfer the dough to a greased bowl, cover it and let it rise until doubled.

While the dough is rising, make the potato filling. Cube the potatoes. Boil them in water until they are soft. Drain and mash the potatoes. Season the mashed potatoes with salt to taste. Add grated cheese to the hot potatoes and mix well. Allow the potato filling to cool before continuing with the filling of the dough.

Punch down the dough and turn it out onto a floured surface and divide into two portions. Cover the dough with greased plastic and let it rest for 15 minutes.

On a parchment-lined baking sheet, roll one portion of dough into a 9-by-13-inch

rectangle or 12-inch circle. Spread the potato filling on the dough to within ½ inch of the edge.

Roll the second portion of dough on a lightly floured surface and place on top of the filling. Pinch the edges together to seal. Prick the top all over with a fork to (this will allow steam to escape during baking). Let the bread rise, covered with greased plastic, for 30 minutes.

Heat the oven to 375 degrees. Bake the bread 30 minutes or until it is browned on top and bottom. Remove it from the oven and cool the bread on a rack.

BOBALKY

For the Dough:

2 cups water

3 tablespoons sugar

2 teaspoons salt

5 tablespoons canola oil or butter

2 packages active dry yeast

6 cups all-purpose flour

For the Syrup:

½ cup poppy seeds

½ cup honey

Make the Dough Balls:

In a medium saucepan, bring to boil 2 cups water, 3 tablespoons sugar, salt, and oil or butter. Cool to lukewarm.

Meanwhile, dissolve yeast in 1 tablespoon sugar and ½ cup warm water.

Place flour in the bowl of a stand mixer or a large bowl. Add lukewarm water, sugar, oil mixture and yeast, sugar, water mixture.

Combine thoroughly and knead until smooth, about 7 minutes in the mixer and at least 10 minutes by hand. Cover and let rise until doubled.

Punch down dough and turn out onto a lightly floured surface. Roll dough ½- to 1-inch thick and cut into pieces that will result in 1-inch balls when rolled between the palms of the hand.

Place on a parchment-lined or well-floured cookie sheet with dough ball sides touching.

Heat oven to 375 degree. Let rise, covered with oiled plastic wrap until nearly doubled.

Bake 15 to 20 minutes or until lightly browned. Cool completely.

Make the Syrup and Assemble:

Grind poppy seeds in a mortar and pestle with a little water or milk and set aside.

When the bobalki are cool, break the balls apart and place them in a colander. Pour just enough boiling water over bobalki to soften them but not turn them into mush. Drain well.

Pour warm honey and ground poppy seeds over all. Stir lightly and serve immediately.
