

# Saint Jerome, Promoter of the Sacred Scriptures

My dear Friends,

One of the essential books to have on hand when a person is doing some critical analysis on any Book of the Sacred Scriptures is entitled The Jerome Biblical Commentary. I was first introduced to this valuable text during my period of priestly formation in the 1970's and I believe that a newer edition has been published since that time. The commentary gives the reader a history of the Book under study, the author of the Book, when it was written and a verse by verse exegesis of what the divinely inspired author was revealing to the community at the time that the particular Book was composed. A variety of highly esteemed scripture scholars from around the world are employed to synthesize the threads of scriptural understanding of Faith and historiography in relationship to Catholic teaching in the Books we hold very dear known as the Word of God, The Bible. Although this commentary is not the "be all, end all" of Catholic scriptural study, it is a tool that is very helpful for the homilist and the student of Sacred Scripture alike. The commentary's title includes the name of the person of Saint Jerome whose memorial is celebrated on 30 September.

Saint Jerome was born in Dalmatia around 340, A.D. His parents were very ardent for a good education for their son so much so that they sent him to Rome where he excelled in linguistics, specializing in Greek and Latin. It was in Rome that he became more interested in Christianity and was received into the Faith when he was about eighteen years of age. After three years in Rome, he traveled to Trier in modern day Germany where he advanced in his studies and in the knowledge of his faith.

He eventually found himself back in his home area when he decided to travel to Antioch, spending four years within the wilderness of the desert, fasting and repenting for sins of his former life prior

to becoming a Christian. Here he grew fonder of living the life of a monk and as a means of purification, he took on the burden of learning Hebrew that later would be most beneficial in his scholarly work with the Sacred Scriptures. He was ordained a priest and then went to Constantinople to study the Scriptures under the guidance of Saint Gregory Nanzianzen. He returned to Rome and at the request of Saint Pope Damasus, he did a revision of the Four Gospels and the Psalms in Latin, guided by the Greek text. He was also employed as a secretary to the Bishop of Rome and some Roman women who were attracted to his ascetic life style formed a community around Saint Jerome.

After the death of Saint Damasus, Saint Jerome left Rome and traveled to Jerusalem via Antioch and ended up in Bethlehem where he would spend the rest of his life. He lived in a cave near the place where tradition held was the birthplace of the Lord in the Basilica of the Nativity. Nearby that great church, a monastery was built for men while three communities of women were housed in other buildings. He opened a school and a hospice as well. But the most outstanding fete of his life was that of translating the Sacred Scriptures. After he had translated the Gospels and the Psalms he went on to do the same with the rest of the Christian Scriptures and then took on the task of translating the Hebrew Scriptures. His enterprise consisted of most of the Old Testament except for the Books of Wisdom, Ecclesiasticus, Baruch, and I and II Maccabees and he did a revision of the Psalms as well. The entire corpus of this translation of the Bible became known as the Vulgate. In the sixteenth century, the Fathers of the Council of Trent declared that the Vulgate to be the authentic Latin text for use in the Catholic Church.

After a lifetime of biblical scholarly work, interwoven with penitential prac-

tices, treatises for the defense of the Faith, charitable concern for the needy, spiritual guidance for the women and men religious that followed his way of life, Saint Jerome died on 30 September 420 and was buried in the Basilica of the Nativity. However, his remains were exhumed and transferred to Rome where they are entombed in Saint Mary Major Basilica.

During his General Audience on 7 November 2007, our Holy Father had this reflection on the person of Saint Jerome. Pope Benedict XVI stated, "What can we learn from Saint Jerome? It seems to me, this above all: to love the Word of God in Sacred Scripture. Saint Jerome said: 'Ignorance of the Scriptures is ignorance of Christ.' It is therefore important that every Christian live in contact and in personal dialogue with the Word of God given to us in Sacred Scripture. This dialogue with Scripture must always have two dimensions: on the one hand, it must be a truly personal dialogue because God speaks with each one of us through Sacred Scripture and it has a message for each one. We must not read Sacred Scripture as a word of the past but as the Word of God that is also addressed to us, and we must try to understand what it is that the Lord wants to tell us. However, to avoid falling into individualism, we must bear in mind that the Word of God has been given to us precisely in order to build communion and join forces in the truth on our journey towards God. Thus, although it is always a personal Word, it is also a Word that builds community that builds the Church. We must therefore read it in communion with the living Church. The privileged place for reading and listening to the Word of God is the liturgy, in which, celebrating the Word and making Christ's Body present in the Sacrament, we actualize the Word in our lives and make it present among us."

# Robert M. Ruzicka - FCSLA Fraternalist of the Year

Robert Ruzicka has been a member of the FCSLA (with the acquisition of Catholic Workman in 2004) since 1976. Although he has never been a branch officer, he is very active in his local branch, W045, in Cedar Rapids, IA. He with the help of his nephew supplied the catering for Goulash Day. He also runs the bingo at this event for St. Wenceslaus Parish.

He has helped organize the annual Christmas Party each year and at the End of Summer Party he did all the ordering for the pig roast. Bob does such an outstanding job ordering the meat dishes for

Branch W045's monthly dinner that he has been given the job permanently.

Bob helps to organize both the annual Turtle Fish and Ham Dinner, as well as, the annual Wild Game Feed. He does not hesitate to use his culinary skills and jumps right in to do the cooking for these events.

Bob has many skills which have benefited Branch W045 through his volunteer service. His electrical, gas, and plumbing knowledge has saved the branch many costly expenses. His skills have carried over into the community with his many hours of volunteer service for St. Wenceslaus Church.

Since the flood waters reached 31.12 feet on the Cedar River in Cedar Rapids, IA on June 13, 2008, Bob has not been home much says his wife. He became the Project Engineer to restore St. Wenceslaus Church and gymnasium. The devastation left by the flood was phenomenal. The river was 19 feet over its 12 feet flood stage. There were 10 square miles of flooded city property. Approximately 5,400 residences and 1,800 business were inundated.

Bob has volunteered 1,800 hours, and his work continues as Project Engineer to rebuild St. Wenceslaus Church and gymnasium. The restoration project began with the church. Many decisions had to be made of what to do first. All of the pews had to be taken out of the main part of the church and the flooring had to be torn up and removed. The floor was replaced with a hardwood floor and carpeting. The pews were refinished and replaced. After months of work the first mass in the restored church was celebrated on St. Wenceslaus Day, September 28, 2008, which happened to be Bob's 70th birthday.

The very next day, restoration of the hall started. Since the entire hall had to be gutted, a decision was made to enlarge the hall. Volunteers took out 4,500 tons of rock. They carried out 77,000 five gallon buckets of rock by hand.

Bob worked hand-in-hand as Project Engineer and Foreman along with the local volunteers and many from other states. The work included excavation, heating, cooling, plumbing, roofing, flooring, and electrical. It also included a complete remodeling of the kitchen. Dave Martin, Parish Manager stated that the renovation work done by Bob and the many other volunteers saved the parish several hundred thousand dollars.



Bob worked with volunteers of all ages on this project that still continues today. He enlisted the expertise of the following men: Jerry Beer, (brother-in-law), Jim Miller, Alan Smejkal, (brother-in-law), Dwayne May and Ed Melicher. Some of the other many volunteers he enlisted to help included the following: Knights of Columbus members, FCSLA members, Ameri-Cor, Xavier High School, Notre Dame University, Des Moine-Dowling High School, and Metro School children.

Many hours were spent tearing up, cleaning, hauling, pouring and painting on

this project. The entire project included the church, church hall, school, gymnasium, kitchen and rebuilding the boiler. There were many young adults who showed up almost everyday to help out on this project. Not only did they help with this project, but they also volunteered their time for the many other projects in Cedar Rapids. It has taken a lot of time, energy, and patience to restore this city from its devastation.

Without the volunteer assistance solicited by Bob an electrician, a plumber, a hauling company, a supply store, and the many others who donated time, supplies, food and labor this project would have been very costly

Bob's greatest joy is to see the many volunteers who helped with this project receive the accolades and not himself. He states, "I could not have done this without the many volunteers of all ages who did not hesitate to roll up their sleeves and pitch in to help. It is very rewarding to see the finished results of a worthwhile project and realizing you helped to put a smile once again on a resident of Cedar Rapids."

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# FCSLA MATCHING FUNDS PROGRAM

# "WHY ARE WE DOING THIS?"

We have all heard the old adage, the more things change the more they stay the same. While it may apply to some areas of life, it certainly does not apply to fraternal benefit societies. The insurance industry has become increasingly complex over the years and this is not likely to change. While at one time fraternal insurers were exempt from many of the complex and laws and regulations applicable to commercial insurers, the vast majority of new laws and regulations apply to commercial and fraternal insurers alike. In order to respond to the increased regulation

and oversight, fraternal insurers have had to become more sophisticated and legally compliant in their daily operations. Long gone are the days when fraternals could be run like a "mom and pop" operation, immune from the vast array of complex insurance laws and regulations.

This purpose of this article is to provide a view of how complex FCSLA's operations have become by walking through a life insurance application and explaining some of the compliance issues that apply and providing the answer to the question: "Why are we doing this?" Subsequent articles will address the even greater amount of compliance issues associated with the solicitation, negotiation, sale and advertising of our life insurance and annuity products.

#### **CHOOSING AN APPLICATION**

Life insurance compliance issues begin far before an applicant sets pen to paper! Before an application is given to the applicant, the Home Office (or the producer or recommender) first has to determine the correct application. FCSLA is now licensed in 45 states. Each of those 45 states has different laws and regulations that we must follow. Many of the states require that an application contain mandatory language such as unique fraud warnings, disclosures, producer or applicant attestations or questions to be answered. Because of this, FCSLA has developed numerous state-specific applications. If the correct application is not completed, many negative consequences could occur: the contract could be considered null and void; the contract could be ruled rescindable; FCSLA could be fined for non compliance with laws; or FCSLA could be vulnerable to legal action based upon issuing an incorrect contract. Choosing the correct application is often challenging in fraternal insurance due to the common practice of grandparents buying policies for grandchildren that live in different states or recommenders selling to individuals living in other states. The correct application generally comes down to making sure that the application matches the state of the owner of the policy as opposed to the individual being insured. However, if you are a recommender and are unsure of which application to use, please contact the Home Office for assistance.

## WHAT GOES IN AN APPLICATION

Once the correct application state has been chosen, the Home Office (or recommender or producer) has to make sure that all required forms are contained in the application. Once again, depending on the state involved, the forms required will be different. Generally, state law requires the following forms:

#### **HIPAA Authorization**

The HIPAA Authorization form is required by the federal Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 ("HIPAA"). One aspect of HIPAA is the implementation of privacy rights for an individual's health information. Among other things, HIPAA restricts an organization's use of an individual's health care information to health purposes only and requires organizations to provide adequate security measures to protect information from misuse or disclosure. As a result of this federal law, doctors are not able to share an applicant's medical information with FCSLA unless the applicant has signed a release. In the event that the release is not signed, FCSLA can not process an application requiring medical underwriting: therefore a certificate can not be issued.

# "To the Proposed Insured" Page (Fieldworker/Agent Report)

The "To the Proposed Insured" Page serves several purposes. First, the form has questions that determine whether the member meets FCSLA's membership requirements. Even these questions are mandated by state law as state law requires that fraternals outline their membership requirements in the society's bylaws and then ensure that the bylaws are followed. State laws (which vary by state and can change over the years) also provide for certain mandatory provisions in a fraternal society's bylaws — necessitating the periodic amendment of our bylaws in order to remain in compliance with the laws. The "To the Proposed Insured" form also serves other compliance purposes as it contains questions involving replacement of insurance and suitability (these issues are discussed in further detail below).

### Non-Conforming Life Illustration Acknowledgment

This form is a consumer protection form that is required by Ohio (and other states') insurance laws and regulations. The laws and regulations regulate all aspects of using illustrations in the marketing of life insurance products including mandating certain information be included in an illustration, indicating when an illustration may be used, providing for the process for obtaining illustration approval from the ODI, and prohibiting the use of incomplete or inaccurate illustrations. If this form is not signed and returned, numerous negative consequences could occur: the contract could be rescinded; the applicant could assert a claim for an unfair trade practice; or FCSLA could be fined or suffer an administrative sanction for non compliance with the Ohio laws.

# Replacement of Life Insurance or Annuities Form and Sales Material Verification

These two forms are required due to Ohio's newly revised replacement regulations. Replacement of existing insurance (replacing an existing policy with a new policy) is a highly regulated area because replacement can often be detrimental to the applicant as it may result in increased fees, lowered cash value, renewed waiting periods and other negative consequences. In the past, unscrupulous producers (not FCSLA producers or recommenders) have convinced applicants to replace existing policies to their detriment, because the replacement resulted in increased commissions for the producers. As a result of these abuses, states have enacted replacement regulations that im-

As Fr. Grosko reflects on his golden jubilee of priestly ordination, he remembers his parents, both born in Republic of Slovakia, who most influenced his decision to become a diocesan priest. "My father, Andrew, in particular had a strong prayer life and a life that was exemplified by his daily spending time in church after his daily work was completed. In my father, I found more than a father, but an abiding friend ever available in my daily conversation with him," he said.

Being numbered the fifth among eight siblings and being born on Easter Sunday morning, Father often says that the Church bells rang as he entered the world to establish his space, his endeavors, and his vocation. His sisters and brothers were a joy and a bond of love and friendship. They are Andrew, Ann, Peggie, Angie, John, Betty, and Juliann. Three siblings, Andrew, John, and Angie have now entered the heavenly kingdom.

Fr. Grosko was born May 27, 1932, in Braddock, and attended St. Michael School. He graduated from Braddock Junior/Senior High School, and then he spent a year in a furniture factory before entering the seminary. After his ordination, he received his first assignment as parochial vicar at St. Albert the Great Parish where he served six years. Subsequently, he served in the following assignments: parochial vicar at St. Ursula – May 1964 to June 1966, chaplain in the U.S. Navy – June 1966 to December 1978. Following these assignments, he pursued studies for Certification of Clinical Pastoral Ministry at Walter Reed Hospital, and pastor of Our Lady of Loretta in Brookline until August 1981.

He then volunteered for several years of Missionary Ministry in the Philippines, where he witnessed endless difficulties of a developing country in the face of dictatorial regime

of President Ferdinand Marcos. From 1981-1986, he served in a voluntary capacity as a missionary in the Philippines in the Diocese of Dumaguete. In this capacity, he was chaplain for Holy Child's Hospital and was deeply involved in raising funds for establishment of the new hospital as previously the old structure was destroyed by the violent activities of the New People's Army (a Communist group).

On his return to the United States, he was assigned to St. Michael in Munhall from October 1992 to January 1996 and as well, served as chaplain in the Children's Hospital in Pittsburgh/Oakland neighborhood. After which, he was assigned as administrator at Holy Martyrs in Tarentum. In 1996, he was named pastor of Resurrection in Brookline where he remained until September 2002, when he became pastor of Holy Trinity Parish in West Mifflin and administrator of St. Agnes Parish in West Mifflin. Currently Father is administrator of both parishes.

Joining in the 50th jubilee celebration were the following board members of the First Catholic Slovak Ladies Association: Monsignor Peter Polando, Chaplain, Irene Drotleff, Secretary, John Janovec, Treasurer, Linda Killeen, Vice-President, Cynthia Maleski and Virginia Holmes, Trustees, and Dorothy Urbanowicz, Auditor.

pose strict duties on insurers and producers. These duties include (but are not limited to): asking all applicants whether they have existing insurance and whether the existing insurance will be replaced; completing a form listing all existing insurance and all insurance being replaced, notifying the existing insurer of the proposed replacement; keeping detailed records of all sales materials used in marketing the replacement policy; obtaining signatures from the applicant regarding the sales materials and replacement information; and keeping and reporting to the ODI detailed statistics regarding the number of replacements each producer has completed on a yearly basis.

#### Suitability Form

The suitability form, while required for nearly all annuity sales, is only required for life insurance applications in states that have life insurance suitability regulations. In general, suitability regulations require insurers and insurance producers to consider the insurance objectives and needs of consumers and to recommend only products that will assist in meeting those needs. Again, this is a consumer protection law that has arisen out of unscrupulous producers recommending insurance products (perhaps products yielding high producer commissions) that were unsuitable – and highly detrimental to the consumer. An example of this is a company that was fined millions by the CA Department of Insurance for tricking senior citizens into buying annuities that would not pay out for years (some over 15

years) and had substantial early withdrawal fees. Because of these incidents, all insurers are now subject to intense regulation and scrutiny. FCSLA can not process a policy without a suitability form (when required). Failure to submit the required suitability forms could result in severe negative consequences, including fines and loss of licensure, to both FCSLA and the producer or recommender.

#### CONCLUSION

The laws and regulations above are just a small part of the numerous complex laws and regulations with which FCSLA must comply. Because there are so many special requirements, the Home Office makes sure that all applications contain the correct forms (both when they are sent out and when they return for processing). If the Home Office receives an incomplete application, the producer or recommender will be contacted to obtain the required information. This is to ensure that we comply with the requirements outlined above — not to serve as an inconvenience to our valuable producers and recommenders.

The next article will continue with the life insurance application and discuss the compliance issues surrounding the sale of the certificate, the processing of the certificate and the actual delivery of the contract. 
# SCF MIDWEST PASTORAL SEMINAR TO BE HELD



## **Branch 350 Donates Bears**





# STRAWBERRY/ BLUEBERRY SHORTCAKE

2 cups sliced fresh strawberries

- 1 cup fresh blueberries
- 3 tablespoons sugar

#### SHORTCAKE:

1 cup all-purpose flour

1/4 cup plus 1 tablespoons sugar, divided

½ teaspoon baking soda

Dash salt

1/4 cup cold butter

1/3 cup milk

1/4 cup sour cream

Whipped cream, optional

In a small bowl, combine the strawberries, blueberries and 2 tablespoons sugar; set aside.

In a large bowl, combine the flour, ¼ cup sugar, baking soda and salt. Cut in butter until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Combine milk and sour cream; stir into crumb mixture just until moistened.

Spread batter into a greased 9-in. pie plate (batter will be thick). Sprinkle with remaining sugar. Bake at 350 degrees for 16-20 minutes or until a toothpick comes out clean. Cool on a wire rack for 10 minutes; cut into six wedges.

Split each wedge in half horizontally. Serve warm with berry mixture; garnish with whipped cream if desired. 6 servings.

## BLUEBERRY CREME PARFAITS

1/2 cup sugar

1 envelope unflavored gelatin

1¾ cups milk

2 cups (16 ounces) sour cream

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

2 cups fresh blueberries

In a medium saucepan, combine sugar

and gelatin. Stir in milk. Cook and stir over medium heat until gelatin is dissolved. Remove from the heat; stir in sour cream and vanilla. Cover and chill for about 2 hours or until the mixture mounds when dropped from a spoon. Spoon into parfait glasses or glass bowls. Top each with ¼ cup berries. Serve immediately. 8 servings.

### WATERMELON SUNDAE

- 1 cup cubed watermelon, seeds removed
- 1 teaspoon honey
- ½ teaspoon ground cinnamon

Vanilla ice cream

In a blender or food processor, combine the watermelon, honey and cinnamon; cover and process until chunky. Serve over ice cream. 4 servings.

### **MELON SALSA**

½ cup each cubed cantaloupe, honeydew and seedless watermelon

1/4 cup chopped red onion

- 1 jalapeno pepper, seeded and chopped
- 2 tablespoons minced fresh cilantro
- 1 tablespoon lime juice
- ¼ teaspoon pepper
- 1/8 teaspoon salt

Tortilla chips

In a small bowl, combine the melon, onion, jalapeno, cilantro, lime juice, pepper and salt. Serve with chips. Refrigerate leftovers. Yield: 1% cups.

# VEGETABLE TURKEY PINWHEELS

- 2 medium yellow summer squash, cut into ½-inch slices
- 1 large sweet yellow pepper, cut into 1-inch pieces
- 1 large sweet red pepper, cut into 1-inch pieces
- 2 large carrots, cut into 1/2-inch slices
- 3 garlic cloves, peeled
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 2 packages (8 ounces each) cream cheese, cubed
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 8 flavored tortillas of your choice (10 inches), room temperature
- 1 pound thinly sliced deli turkey
- 4 cups torn Bibb or Boston lettuce

Place the squash, peppers, carrots and garlic in a 15-in. x 10-in. x 1-in. baking pan coated with cooking spray. Drizzle with oil; toss to coat. Bake, uncovered, at 450 degrees for 25-30 minutes or until lightly browned and tender, stirring once. Cool slightly.

Place the vegetables, cream cheese,

salt and pepper in a food processor; cover and process until blended. Transfer to a bowl; cover and refrigerate for 2-3 hours or until thickened.

Spread ½ cup cream cheese mixture over each tortilla; layer with turkey and lettuce. Roll up tightly; wrap each in plastic wrap. Refrigerate for at least 1 hour. Unwrap and cut each into eight slices. 64 appetizers.

# GRILLED CHICKEN THIGHS & DRUMSTICKS

21/2 cups packed brown sugar

2 cups water

2 cups cider vinegar

- 2 cups ketchup
- 1 cup canola oil
- 4 tablespoons salt
- 3 tablespoons prepared mustard
- 4½ teaspoons Worcestershire sauce
- 1 tablespoon soy sauce
- 1 teaspoon pepper
- 10 pounds bone-in chicken thighs and chicken drumsticks
- ½ teaspoon seasoned salt

In a large bowl, combine the first 10 ingredients. Pour into two large resealable plastic bags; add chicken. Seal bags and turn to coat; refrigerate overnight.

Prepare grill for indirect heat. Drain and discard marinade. Sprinkle chicken with seasoned salt. Grill chicken skin side down, covered, over indirect medium heat for 15 minutes. Turn; grill 15-20 minutes longer or until juices run clear. 12-14 servings.

## **SPICY PASTA SALAD**

- 1 package (16 ounces) spiral pasta
- 1 pound ground beef
- 34 cup water
- 1 envelope taco seasoning
- 2 cups (8 ounces) shredded cheddar cheese
- 1 large green pepper, chopped
- 1 medium red onion, chopped
- 1 medium tomato, chopped
- 2 cans (2¼ ounces each) sliced ripe olives, drained
- 1 bottle (16 ounces) Catalina salad dressing

Cook pasta according to package directions. Meanwhile, in a skillet, cook beef over medium heat until no longer pink; drain. Add water and taco seasoning; simmer uncovered for 15 minutes. Rinse pasta in cold water and drain; place in a large bowl. Add beef mixture, cheese, green pepper, red onion, tomato and olives; mix well. Add the dressing and toss to coat. Cover and refrigerate for at least 1 hour.

Serve with Nacho cheese flavored tortilla chips. 10 servings.



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
